
ONTARIO CURRICULAR CONNECTIONS



The Treasure Box Curricular Connections

Kindergarten:

- **Personal and Social Development:** Identify and express emotions related to changes and transitions.
- Language: Develop oral communication skills through storytelling and discussion.

Grade 1:

- Language: Retell stories in sequence to demonstrate comprehension.
- Social Studies (Heritage and Identity): Explore family structures and how they change over time.
- Science (Daily and Seasonal Changes): Describe how the environment affects daily life.

Grade 2:

- Language: Identify the main idea and supporting details in texts.
- Social Studies (Global Communities): Investigate the diversity of communities around the world.
- Science (Growth and Changes in Animals): Understand how living things adapt to new environments.

Grade 3:

- Language: Make text-to-self and text-to-world connections.
- Social Studies (Communities in Canada): Compare historical and contemporary communities in Canada.

Grade 4:

- Language: Analyze challenges faced by characters in texts.
- Social Studies (Early Societies): Investigate the characteristics of early societies and their contributions.

Grade 5:

- Language: Summarize themes in literary and informational texts.
- Social Studies (First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Peoples): Examine the histories and cultures of Indigenous peoples in Canada.
- Science (Human Organ Systems): Understand the impact of stress on health and well-being.

Grade 6:

- Language: Analyze how an author's perspective influences storytelling.
- Social Studies (Communities in Canada, Past and Present): Investigate the factors that influence migration and settlement.

Grade 7:

- Language: Evaluate the effectiveness of different literary techniques.
- **History** (New France and British North America): Examine historical events that influenced migration and settlement patterns.
- Science (Heat in the Environment): Investigate the impact of extreme weather conditions on human survival.

Grade 8:

- Language: Analyze character development and the role of setting in literature.
- **History** (**Confederation**): Study the political, social, and economic factors that shaped Canada.
- Science (Water Systems): Examine the role of water in human survival and settlement.

Grade 9:

- English: Analyze themes, character development, and narrative structure in texts.
- **History (Canadian History Since WWI):** Investigate the impact of historical events on individuals and communities.
- Geography (Issues in Canadian Geography): Examine factors that influence population distribution and migration.
- **Health and Physical Education:** Identify strategies for conflict resolution and well-being.

Grade 10:

- **English:** Evaluate how perspective and identity shape literature.
- **History (Canadian History Since WWI):** Analyze key events in Canadian history and their impact.
- **Civics and Citizenship:** Explore the rights and responsibilities of citizens in diverse communities.
- **Science** (**Biology Genetics**): Understand hereditary traits and their transmission through generations.

Grade 11:

- English: Examine how literature reflects historical and cultural contexts.
- **History (World History to the 16th Century):** Investigate major events that shaped societies.
- Social Sciences (Introduction to Anthropology, Psychology, and Sociology): Explore factors that shape identity and social interactions.
- **Health and Physical Education:** Understand the role of mental health in personal and social well-being.

Grade 12:

- **English:** Critically analyze texts for underlying themes and messages.
- **History (World History Since the 15th Century):** Examine global migration patterns and social change.
- Social Sciences (Equity and Social Justice): Assess barriers to equity and explore solutions for social change.
- **Philosophy:** Investigate ethical theories and decision-making frameworks.
- Mathematics (Financial Literacy): Analyze financial factors affecting personal and societal stability.
