Welcome to Part II of the Assmann Family History!

Shelley and I so appreciated Barbara's support, and me doubly so these last few months during the preparation for publication.

Barbara says her grandmother, Elisabeth Assmann (1905-1983), would have been very, very happy and proud with this family history, and I know Shelley and my grandfathers would be grateful and proud too.

Shelley and I had decided that although we could have continued researching and exploring more details and going further in depth with subsequent generations of each of the families, that we had to stop at some point to get the information out before the older generations were gone. We know we may be missing people who may have liked to have been in the pages of this family chronicle.

Shelley, Barbara, and I hope other family members will pick up the gauntlet and explore and record their own family lines to keep the legacy alive for future generations.

For now, here is the research we did accomplish, and the results the labours of our combined work.

INTRODUCTION

In Part 1, we explored the earliest research into the Assmann family origins, extending from the early 1600s to the late 1800s, with some migrating to other countries until the families first arrived on the shores of North America in the 1890s.

Some of our family remained in Germany, the homeland of our ancestors, and we are excited to have met some of their descendants who today still live in Gehlweiler and other surrounding villages and towns. We also discovered that during those earlier centuries, several branches of our direct line migrated to Galicia, Austria in the late 1700's and then by the mid-1800s their descendants moved to Volhynia in Russia. (Both of these locations now belonging to Ukraine.) Some families remained in Austria like those of our cousin, Barbara Denscher, editor and producer of our family history books. (See her family's story in Part I)

The earliest generation of our ancestors to come to North America was Johann Jakob Assmann (1827-1906) and Maria Elisabeth Reisdorf (1831-1902) who migrated to Symco, Wisconsin, USA. They came to live near several of their children and families in Wisconsin, while some of their offspring had already made their homes at Neudorf, Saskatchewan, Canada. Part II focuses on the each of the families of their oldest son, Karl Assmann (1858-1926) and his wife Katharina Elisabeth Erbach (1831-1902) of Neudorf Saskatchewan, who were Shelly and my great-grandparents. When they arrived in Canada in 1892, the area was then known as the North-West Territories, later becoming the province of Saskatchewan in 1905. Karl chose to homestead on the Southeast Quarter, Section 20, Township 19, Range 8, West of the Second Meridian (SE 1/4-20-19-8 W2), a parcel of land in its natural unbroken state which lay to the south of Neudorf, where they raised their family.



JACOB ASSMANN & CAROLINA BENDER

Johann Jacob Assmann¹ was born 22 August 1884, in Metnitz, Volhynia, Russia (now Ukraine)² to Karl Assmann (1858-1926) and Katharina Elisabeth (Lizzie) Erbach (1863-1945). He married **Carolina Bender**³; died 12 December 1970, Melville, Saskatchewan, Canada.⁴



There seem to be some discrepancies about the date of his birth as throughout his life he celebrated it on August 18, and many of his documents, plus his headstone all record August 18 as his date of birth.

This discrepancy seems to stem in part from his baptismal records which may not be reliable. It has the title: "Geborene im Jahre 1885" - "Born in 1885" - but there are, mixed up, births from 1881, 1883, 1884 in it. Perhaps it was written later.

In this document it indicates he may have been baptized in Schitomir Parish, Volhynia, Russia,⁵ but the exact location is unknown at this time. There also seems to have been an error by the pastor in entering his baptismal information in the first place as the dates seem to have been put in the wrong columns as shown below. The column for birth has him born on 26 August at 2 pm, while the baptism is recorded as 22 August, so the baptismal entry may be wrong in various ways.

His two next siblings were also born in Metnitz, Johann (born 1887) and Elisabeth (born 1889). Note that Jacob, according to his baptismal record, was baptized with the name Johann, but obviously went by Jacob during his life, as his next brother was also given the name of Johann (John), which he was called during his life. Back then there was a common practice to give all sons the same name, e.g. Johann, as a baptismal first name followed by the second name they would use in everyday life.

Baptism record of Johann (Jacob) Assmann.⁶

Jacob was seven years old when he traveled with his family to North America.⁷ Once his family became settled their thoughts turned towards school. Being the oldest, he went to school for one only day before his father decided he needed him to help on the farm.

On the 29 May 1898 Jacob was confirmed at Zion Lutheran Church near Grenfell.

On the 17 April 1897, he was granted naturalization in Canada, which at this time was in the North-West Territories. He later renewed this naturalization under new legislation in Canada on the 21 January 1942.



In 1907 Jacob bought some farmland seven miles north of Neudorf on Section 32-20 -7-W 2nd.

On 12 February 1907, Jacob married Caroline Bender (also known as Caroline) in a double wedding with his brother Johann and her sister, Katherine Bender. The sisters were the daughters of Caroline Zaph and Philip Bender. Jacob's bride Caroline was born in Metnitz, Russia, on 3 September 1889.

In 1911, Jacob, Caroline and their first two children, Philip Carl and Emma Caroline, were living on Township 20, Range 7, West of the Second Meridian. Jacob was farming and had a 17-year-old hired-hand, Adam Mohr. Adam Mohr was paid \$610 in 1910.¹¹

According to the 1916 Census of Prairie Provinces, Jacob and family were still in Township 20, Range 7, West of the Second Meridian. A third child was listed on the census, Edward. Jacob was listed as a farmer. The hired hand was not listed, so he may not have been needed by this time.

Jacob and Caroline had five children: Philip Carl, Emma Caroline, Edward Jacob, Wilhelm (William) Werner, and Maria Helena (Mary).

According to his daughter Mary, *"Dad [Jacob] might not have had any education but was a clever man, self-taught you might say. He was always at the head of a project like building the Prairie School, the local curling and skating rink, and the Christ Lutheran Church and Parish Hall. He was on the Municipal board for years and on the Lutheran Home Board in Melville for over 25 years and of course on the church board plus any band drives etc. that they had during the 2nd World War he was always very active in anything worthwhile that went on in the community."*¹²

He became trustee of the Prairie School for ten years. When the telephones first arrived in that part of the country, he was one of the first to help organize and partake in the construction of the telephone system. He was always willing to help with anything worthwhile in the community. Caroline was also a very active. She was a member of the Christ Lutheran Church Women for 41 years.

There was a decided change for the better when Mrs. Waldbauer directed me to Mr. Jacob Asman. He is an old timer in the community with a wide experience in farming and in community affairs. At the time of my visit he was eighty-five years old. Both he and Mrs. Asman were spry and alert and did not look their age. At last we had found some one who had something to offer.

From what I can gather Mr. Asman experienced all the hardships that befall the early pioneers. Undaunted, he went on to become a prominent and successfull farmer. From a beginning in a house with only a roof, no doors or windows or plaster on the walls he rose to a fine modern home with all modern conveniences. As Mr. Asman said, "it all came out alright in the end."

Jacob Asman came to Canada with his parents from Holynien, Russia in May, 1892. His father, Karl, moved to Russia from the village of Alt Yazow in the province of Galicia, Austria.

They landed in Winnipeg after about a month on the road. His father left his family in Winnipeg and went on to Grenfell to look for a homestead and a place in which to live. He homesteaded on Section 20 T18 R8 W2. John Goebel, about four miles from his place, had an empty granery which he let them use while he built his house. Rumor was that no cattle could be bought in this area so he brought two cows and two steers. They were to have been broken in but were not. He bought a plow, harrows,

This partial snippet from an interview conducted by an unknown person was found in Edward Assman's files and provides information about the early days of pioneering.¹³

On the following pages you will find the full Land Agreement, Jacob signed on 15 October 1918 for the purchase of crown land for the east half of Sec 20, Twp 17, Range 6, West of the 2nd meridian. Originally owned by the Government of Saskatchewan, it shows all the conditions required to meet the requirements for final ownership.¹⁴

Together with interest from the date hereof at the rate of Seven per cent. per annum on so much of said purchase price as remains unpaid from time to time and payable on the first day of December in each and every year hereafter until the said purchase price is paid, and interest and principal not paid when due shall bear interest at the rate aforesaid from the date when it becomes due.

The above instalments of purchase money and interest are payable at *Regina* agreed.

*Provided that the Purchaser is then given the privilege
of paying the whole or any part of said purchase
price at any time but not so as to
postpone any of the payments agreed.*

The Purchaser covenant with the Vendor that he will insure the buildings on the said land to the amount of not less than the full insurable value thereof, and in default of such insurance, the Vendor may insure as he deem expedient at the expense of the Purchaser. Policies of insurance to be deposited with the Vendor and losses, if any, to be payable to the Vendor.

And the said part Y of the second part hereby attorney and becomes tenant of and to the said part Y of the first part to said land at a yearly tenancy equal to the amount of the yearly payment of interest due upon the purchase money hereof, provided that the part Y of the first part may distrain for arrears of purchase money and interest.

And it is also hereby declared and agreed that the Vendor may pay any liens, taxes or rates upon the said land or any insurance premium and any money so paid or expenses so incurred shall be charged upon the said land in favor of the Vendor and shall be payable by the Purchaser to the Vendor forthwith with interest at the rate aforesaid until paid.

And it is hereby declared and agreed that all erections, buildings and improvements on or hereafter put upon the said premises shall thereupon become fixtures and form part of the realty.

No assignment of this contract shall be valid unless the same be for the entire interest of the Purchaser and shall be endorsed hereon or permanently attached hereto and approved and countersigned by the Vendor or his duly authorized agent.

The Purchaser agrees to break one hundred acres of said land in the year 1919, said breaking to be done in proper season and in a workmanlike manner.

The Purchaser agrees to cultivate the land broken and to be broken and to seed the same in proper season, the same to be done in a workmanlike manner.

The Purchaser further agrees to use clean seed in seeding the said land and to keep the said land free and clean of weeds as far as possible.

In Witness Whereof, the Vendor and the Purchaser have hereunto set their hands and seals the day and year first above written.

Now it is hereby agreed between the parties aforesaid in the manner following that is to say: the Purchaser covenant ~~s~~, promises and agrees to and with the said Vendor that the Purchaser will well and truly pay or cause to be paid to the said Vendor the said sums of money together with interest thereon at the rate aforesaid on the days and times and manner above mentioned; and also will pay and discharge all taxes, rates and assessments wherewith the said land may be rated or charged when due from or after ~~this date~~ *the 31st day of December 1918.*

Provided that on any default in the payment of any instalment of either principal or interest or taxes the whole of the principal or interest hereby secured shall at once become due and be payable or this contract shall be forfeited and determined, at the option of the Vendor.

In Consideration Whereof and on payment of the said sums of money with interest as aforesaid, in manner aforesaid, the Vendor doth covenant, promise and agree to and with the Purchaser to convey and assure or cause to be conveyed or assured to the Purchaser the said parcel of land by deed or transfer subject to the conditions and reservations in the original grant from the Crown, which deed or transfer shall be prepared by the Vendor's solicitor ~~at the expense of the Purchaser~~.

The Purchaser shall immediately after the execution of this agreement have the right of possession to said premises, and shall have the right to occupy and enjoy the same until default be made in the payment of the said sums of money, or the interest thereon, or any part thereof on the days and times and in the manner above mentioned.


And it is further agreed between the parties hereto that until the completion of the purchase the Purchaser shall hold the said premises as tenant to the Vendor from the day of the execution hereof at a ~~sum~~ yearly rental equivalent to, applicable in satisfaction of and payable at the same time as the instalments of principal and interest upon the principal hereinbefore provided to be paid; the legal relation of landlord and tenant being hereby constituted between the Vendor and the Purchaser.

And it is further agreed that in case the Purchaser shall at any time make default in any of the payments ~~by~~ ~~set~~ herein agreed to be paid, or in any part thereof or in the performance of any of the covenants herein contained, the Vendor shall be at liberty at any time after such default, without notice to the Purchaser either to cancel this contract and declare the same void, and to retain any payments that may have been made on account thereof as and by way of liquidated damages, and retain all improvements that may have been made on said premises, or to proceed to another sale of the said lands, either by public auction, tender or private contract, and the deficiency, if any occasioned by such default, shall be made good by the said Purchaser, and the Vendor shall be entitled immediately upon any default, as aforesaid, without giving any notice or making any demand to consider and treat the Purchaser as tenant, holding over, without permission or any color or right, and may take immediate possession of the premises and remove the Purchaser therefrom.

And it is mutually understood and agreed that in case default be made by the Purchaser in any of the covenants and agreements herein contained to be performed ~~by~~ ~~set~~ and the Vendor shall see fit to declare this contract null and void by reason thereof, such declaration may be made by notice from the Vendor addressed to the Purchaser directed to the Post Office hereinbefore mentioned.

And it is further agreed that time is to be considered the essence of this agreement.

And the covenants and agreements herein contained shall extend to and be binding upon the heirs, executors, administrators, assigns and successors of the parties hereto.

A BIOGRAPHY OF
CAROLINE ASSMAN (nee BENDER)

On September 3, 1889 Caroline Assman (nee, Bender) was born to the parents of Karolina (nee, Zapf) and Philip Bender in Walinia, Russia. She was baptized into the Christian faith while in Russia by the Rev. Wasen on the 22nd of June 1889. Caroline became one member of a family which grew to five sons and 4 daughters.

Caroline's parents decided to come to Canada so on the 6th of August 1894 she set foot in Halifax and then proceed with her family to Grenfell. After a short time in Grenfell her folks started farming in now the Neudorf area. The Bender family also became members of Zion Lutheran Church, the congregation where she made her confirmation on June 3, 1903.

While on the farm she met a Neudorf boy, Jacob Assman, whom she married on February 12, 1907. God blessed their marriage with three sons, Philip, Edward (both who have predeceased their mother) and William, two daughters, Emma and Mary, seven grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

During the year of 1925 she and Jacob moved to the town of Neudorf, where they lived together until Jacob's death on December 12, 1970. She remained alone in town until the fall of 1971 then began her residence at St. Paul's Lutheran Home in Melville.

While she lived in Neudorf she was known for her quilting, crocheting and wedding cake baking abilities. She was very active in the founding of Christ Lutheran Church and was one of the last living charter members. She was also very active in the then Lady's Aid of the congregation.


"My mom and dads' story" (from Sandra Krycwchuk, daughter):









Heather's Eulogy

We were asked to read a eulogy honouring Heather, by her daughter Barbara. Perhaps the best place to start is by introducing ourselves and how we were a part of Heather's life and she of ours.

We have all known Heather in different times and places. This telling of her life aims to unite the pieces so that we may see the whole mosaic in its brilliant entirety. In the months and weeks before Heather passed away and the days that followed, her friends, family, former colleagues and students shared their memories and admiration of her with Barbara. Those thoughtful reflections have framed what we will share here with you today.

Heather was born in Kerrobert, Saskatchewan on January 4th, 1948 as the first child of Norm and Mary McConnachie. Younger sister Gail came along 4 years later. Considered a "city kid" by Saskatchewan standards, Heather still had plenty of exposure to the natural world playing outside as a child and going to the countryside to be with extended family. Saskatoon berry picking was a common job of Heather's, as was chasing and capturing the headless chickens after a slaughter. Perhaps this no doubt terrifying experience had something to do with Heather becoming a long-time vegetarian as an adult!

Heather saw value in having a breadth of experiences to enrich her life, and this was evident even as a school-aged girl. She was involved in curling, judo, garden club, swimming, figure skating, student council and social club, amongst other activities. I'm sure many of us identified this character trait of community involvement in the adult Heather we knew, whether through her volunteerism, participation in committees, or organization of social events amongst circles of friends. Heather is the common thread that has brought many of us together to develop friendships with each other. Friendships that may not have existed had it not been for her consideration in involving us in shared activities.

Heather was a very independent person in her pursuit of what she felt was right for herself. After graduating from high school she attended post- secondary studies at the University of Saskatchewan, majoring in biology. To pay her own way through school she worked summers at a circus selling foot- long hotdogs and held a job working at a geriatric mental health hospital. To this already interesting resume of employment, she would eventually add working as an office typist, playground supervisor, print shop worker, gas jockey, supervisor of a teen drop-in centre, phone book delivery person, dining car waitress, fruit picker, nut factory worker, florist, curriculum developer, massage therapist, retail salesperson and teacher.

After graduating with her Bachelor of Science degree she stayed at the University of Saskatchewan for an additional year to complete a Diploma of Education. It was through the medium of teaching that she would share her passion for science, discovery and pursuit of knowledge with young learners. Administrators evaluated her teaching methods and participation in school life most favourably, one saying she was "one of the finest teachers I have had the pleasure to work with. Her superior knowledge in her subject specialty and her ability to use this as a motivating force, interest in and enthusiasm for science is evident. Heather's total involvement and contribution to school programs and activities has been greatly appreciated by her students, her colleagues, and of course the community. The professional leadership she has shown at our school and her commitment to education generally and her students specifically deserves special commendation and recognition."

Another school principal reflected that "her dedication to developing a meaningful science program for students was well known. I was greatly impressed by the skill she exhibited in interpreting the science program of studies into meaningful learning activities for the students. She is an excellent teacher, and I would be very pleased to have her again as a part of my school staff. One of Ms. McConnachie's outstanding characteristics is her willingness to give of her time over and above the call of duty to assist students, staff, and the school in a variety of ways."

Heather was a true educator, understanding that learning could happen in different forms and contexts. She greatly valued the natural world as a place for people to identify relationships between concepts and reality; to make connections and have those "aha" moments of clarity and understanding. Heather provided opportunities for her junior high school students and, later in life, her English as a Second Language students to do just this. She organized outdoor nature programs, coordinated a west coast boat trip crewing a ship, took students white water rafting, camping and hiking, never missing out on an opportunity for others to add to their breadth of life experience that Heather thought was so valuable for us all to do for personal growth and development.

Heather was adventurous and uncompromising in living her life in the way that was true to her spirit. This was reflected in her travels both within Canada and internationally. After her first year

of teaching in Calgary, Heather left Canada on a ship bound for Australia. Although she left solo, in her travels she would attract other people with her vibrant spirit, good humour, kind heart, giving nature and passion for many things. Some of the people she met along the way became lifelong friends who are here among us today. Heather had many adventures in Australia, New Zealand, Asia, the former USSR and Europe, before returning to Canada with barely a penny to her name. She hitchhiked from Eastern Canada to Saskatchewan being picked up mostly by long-haul truck drivers. Her ability to appreciate people and situations as they are enabled her to take everything in stride. One such situation arose when she spent the night sleeping in a gazebo in a public park in Thunder Bay. Heather woke to a flashlight beam shining in her eyes, surrounded by police officers who drove her to the edge of town and gave her a lifetime ban from ever returning to their fine town!

Heather returned shortly to teaching science in Calgary where she married former husband Wayne and had two daughters, Ainsley and Barbara. One of her greatest gifts to her children was allowing and encouraging them to experience life in a way that was true to their spirits, just as she had. Heather shared her passion for nature and diverse experiences with them from a young age. Three weeks after Barbara was born, Heather was already taking her out cross-country skiing snuggled in a carrier, much to the surprise and admiration of fellow skiers on the trail. Heather imparted a sense of wonder in the world around us to her daughters, travelling abroad with them, spending time in the mountains she loved so dearly, and allowing them to learn from truly experiencing life.

Although Heather took time off from teaching to raise her children and support her family, this did not mean that such an active woman as she was taking it easy, by any means. She became involved in her daughters' school committees, volunteered with community associations, canvassed door-to-door for foundations, and developed new relationships as her network of acquaintances and friends grew. Heather became an important member of the local community where she was raising her family, and supported people just as they would offer love and friendship in the coming years of achievements and setbacks in her life.

On behalf of Heather's family, we thank you for being here today and giving us the time to speak. Heather has the respect of many people who experienced the generosity, kindness, integrity and passion that embodied the person she was and shall remain forever in our hearts. Thank you.

PERSONAL HISTORY OF GAIL ANNE McCONNACHIE

I was born in Weyburn, Saskatchewan on April 2, 1952 at 2:30 a.m. Dr. Eaglesham was the delivering Doctor. My parents were Norman McConnachie, who was 31 years old at the time of my birth, and Mary Helen McConnachie (née Assman) who was 28 years old. Mom always said she didn't want an April Fool's baby so kept her legs crossed until April 2.

I had an older sister, Heather Dianne McConnachie, who was 5 years of age when I was born.

My dad worked for the Royal Bank of Canada and as such, we were transferred several times while I was a youth.

First was Macklin, SK. I don't remember much about Macklin except for the fact we got our faithful, funny, loving dog there. He was a Black Labrador and was the runt of the litter. We named him Muggs and he was a faithful companion for over 11 years. I do remember a huge slide at the local school where Muggs learned to climb the wooden stairs and slid down with us. I also remember a vacant lot we walked through to go to a friend's home that was filled with dragonflies in the summer, which is where I probably began my love of dragonflies.

After Macklin, we moved to Gull Lake, SK. I believe I was about 4 years of age then. My best friend when we lived there was Gale Tesluk who was a year older than I was. Gale started school a year ahead of me, of course, but apparently many afternoons, Muggs and I would accompany Gale to school after lunch and we were allowed to sit in class during the first lesson. I have no idea what was learned, if anything, but that was a memory. In Gull Lake my parents made life-long friends and there were many coffee dates, dinner parties and social gatherings with Lloyd and Wilma Thompson and their families (Heather was best friends with one of their daughter's, Dixie), Vi and Eldie Dever and boys, Vern and Doreen Dever and their family, Dayton and Hazel Toney and their girls, and many bank employees that worked with dad. A highlight I vividly remember was after church on Sundays, on warm spring, summer, fall days, many families would pack a picnic lunch, throw swimming gear and blankets in vehicles and head to Craig's Ranch for an afternoon of socializing. We kids swam in the creek and fought with the cows for swimming rights. Parents played baseball or just sat and visited. I started school in Gull Lake and we were transferred to Estevan when I was about 9 years old. Mom signed Heather and I up for ballet and tap-dancing lessons as well as piano lessons while we were in Gull Lake. Didn't become proficient in any of these!

I did most of my adolescent life in Estevan, making many friends that are still very special to me. My best friend was Karen Rowan and to this day, we are still friends, see each other regularly and have seen each other through many ups and downs in both our lives. In Estevan both my sister and I were active in Figure Skating, United Church clubs, swimming lessons. I continued with piano lessons for several years but asked to quit when I didn't like a new teacher. I played flute in the Junior and High School Band. In 1966 the High School band travelled by train to PEI and were the guest band at the Charlottetown Lobster Festival. I learned to drive in Estevan and got my driver's licence on my 16th birthday. I remember when doing my parallel park and pulling forward I almost hit the vehicle in front of me, however I still passed! My schooling was from grade 4 to half way through grade 11, when we were transferred to Swift Current. In Estevan I was an A student.

When I was younger, each summer I went to Bible Camp at Carlyle Lake. It was a United Church camp and I usually went for 2 weeks. I think it was just a break for my parents. To this day I still remember the "camp song." "I ya ya yike us, nobody likes us, we are the girls from Carlyle camp, always a grinnin' always a winnin', always having fun!" There were probably more versus but.... After I was too old for camp, I was a leader for one summer. Not my thing!

The move to Swift Current in 1969 - halfway through a school year was very hard on me. Social groups (cliques) had already been formed and as the "new girl" I was readily accepted into the "bad girl" group. My grades declined, I skipped school, learned to drink and smoke dope! However, I did graduate!

One of the memories of my first summer in Swift Current was babysitting for a family at their cabin in Cypress Hills. I heard later that a couple of babysitters had quit before I was hired. Basically, I was a slave as well as a caregiver for their 2 children. I think the boy was maybe 8 and the girl 6 or so. Occasionally I was allowed to drive the children around Cypress in the owner's Camaro. I did not drive fast nor recklessly. Apparently, the muffler had to be replaced on the vehicle at some point and at the end of the summer when I got paid, they deducted the price of the muffler from my pay. I was devastated that they would do this without consulting me but I was too timid to say anything. After graduation I got a job at one of the local highway stop restaurants – The Voyageur Restaurant I worked for a few months there until two girlfriends and I decided we were moving to Calgary. We moved Thanksgiving weekend of 1970.

Initially the 3 of us lived together (Bernice Garry, Pam Steadman and I) until Pam moved to Cranbrook to live with her parents. I got a job with the Royal Bank as a teller with my first bank being Hillcrest Branch and the second being the Calgary Tower Branch. After a year and a half, I discovered banking wasn't for me and went to Henderson's Business College to obtain a secretarial certificate. After graduating from there I worked for Hudson's Bay Oil and Gas Company Limited, Wainoco Oil and Shaw Cable.

Calgary, at the time, was in the middle of the oil boom and it was party central. Unfortunately, I partied too much, didn't know how to budget and after 6 years in Calgary, phoned my parents one day and asked if I could move home to get my shit together as well as my lifestyle. They said they'd think about it! Thankfully they called about a week later and said I could move home, with conditions. Looking back, it must have been very difficult for them to have an adult child move home.

Shortly after returning home, I met Ron Nelson and a year later we were married and moved to the farm approximately 6 miles north of town. We had dogs, cats, horses. I always had a large garden and enjoyed the solitude of the farm. Ron and I were married in 1977 and divorced in 1993. During that time, we did several trips to Hawaii and Arizona, either having someone stay at the farm while we were gone or relying on my father to feed the animals.

After moving back to Swift Current, I obtained employment with Anderson & Company, a local law firm. At the time they were known as Anderson, Nimegeers, Walter, Gibbings, Ryan, Froslee & Keene. Initially I was front desk reception and then worked for Murray Walter. I stayed there for 10 years and then worked for Western Credit Union as the Secretary to the Manager. During that time, I did a lot of Human Resources work, writing the new HR Policy, doing initial interviews for people being hired. The work was very interesting. When my initial boss was transferred to Regina, the new Manager and I didn't quite see eye to eye and I was fired for "breach of confidentiality." I was devastated as what I had done was tease one of the other employees about an applicant having more credentials than her. Oh well. Onward. I then obtained employment with the City RCMP and worked there for 18 years. During that time, work was all shift work and became very difficult as our "supervisor" was very unfair to all staff and screwed the system royally herself. Eventually she was fired for harassment.

I transferred to the City of Swift Current and worked in the Planning and Development Services Department for almost 8 years before retiring at age 63.

In 1999, after a long friendship, Don Priest and I cohabited for a few years before marrying on August 30, 2003. We had a fabulous and fun backyard wedding at our residence with family and friends. Marrying Don, I acquired 5 step-children, David, Kari, Jaime, Daniel and Jeremy. Very interesting times as I had no experience parenting and wanted to be the "good" step-mother. The

kids teased me about being the wicked step-mother. Eventually all accepted me and since that time 4 have married and have given us 7 wonderful grandchildren.

Don and I have done quite a bit of travelling. Most of our trips were to Vancouver Island as we love Victoria and surrounding area. Our first venture together was to Vancouver Island where we stayed at a friend's house in Shawnigan Lake. The owners were absent as one worked in Swift Current and one worked overseas. It was a fun time with day trips to Victoria, Parksville and just exploring. We have done 3 cruises. The first was the end of January 2005 with co-workers in the RCMP (Rick and Sue Newstead and Doug and Karen Dersch) and was a 13 day 11 night Eastern Caribbean cruise with Celebrity Cruise Lines. We cruised from Tampa with stops in Nassau, Puerto Rico, St. Thomas, St. Maarten, Tortola, Key West and back to Tampa. Our second cruise was a New England cruise with Holland America that was 7 days and 5 nights at the end of September 2015. We cruised from Montreal with stops in Quebec City, Charlottetown, Sydney, Halifax, Bar Harbor and Boston. This cruise was with 2 couples that we chum with in Swift Current (Larry and Gloria Stephens and Larry and Gloria Gerl). The third cruise was an Alaska cruise, again with Holland America. Departed from Vancouver with stops in Juneau, Skagway, Glacier Bay, Ketchikan and back to Vancouver. This was mid-September 2016. This was also with 2 couples that are friends from Swift Current (Ken and Kari Moore and Kari's dad, Cameron Driedger and Larry and Gloria Gerl). We have also done several trips to the Mayan Riviera and Dominican. All were fabulous.

My mom was diagnosed with Emphysema and dealt with the disease for approximately 6 years before her death on September 8, 1997 at age 74. My father remarried in 2002 to Shirley Wilson. He died on March 9, 2015 at age 94. My sister, Heather, was diagnosed with ALS in 2013 and died on July 15, 2015.

During my lifetime we have made many special friends that we hold very dear. Our exceptionally close friends are Larry and Gloria Stephens, with whom we have been friends for over 20 years. We have had dinner parties at each other's homes over those years. At some point we started recording dates on a wine bag that we reused and at last count we were well over 300 dinners and are now on our third bag.

In the spring of 2022, we noted changes in my speech. This included slurring and having problems enunciating. After many appointments with doctors, neurologists, having a CT scan and MRI, I was finally diagnosed with Bulbar Palsy before Christmas. It was a very frustrating time. So now that we have a diagnosis, we're just living as normally as we can for as long as I can. We have wonderful friends and family that are here for us. We have our big, goofy, loyal dog, Karl, (a Bernese Mountain Dog) to keep us active and entertained.

So that's my life! Enjoy each day because you never know what life might bring you. Cheers!!!

JOHANN (JOHN) ASSMANN & (I) KATHARINA BENDER & (II) PHILIPINA ADAM

Johann (John) Assmann, was born 12 January 1887, in Metnitz, Volhynia, Russia;¹ he married **Katharina Bender**² and after her death **Philipina Adam**. He died 22 January 1981, Melville, Saskatchewan, Canada.³



Johann (John) Assmann (later Assman) came to Canada with his parents at age 4. He grew up on a farm near Neudorf. He married Katharina Bender, on 12 February 1907. She was the daughter of Caroline Zaph and Philip Bender, born in Metnitz, Russia, on 15 July 1886 and became known as Katherine. They were married in a double wedding with his brother Jacob and her sister Caroline.

John and Katherine had eight children: Philip, Karl Adolf, Ernest Herman, Eva, John Earl, Frederick, Elmer Harold and Bernard.

From there they moved to Strasbourg for another three years, where Fred was born and then moved on to Ceylon for three and a half years. **MRS. JOHN ASSMANN
DIES AT WINNIPEG**

ELLISBORO, Sask., Oct. 3.—At the Winnipeg General hospital Thursday morning, Mrs. John Assmann died in her 49th year. She came to Canada from Russia when a child to the Neudorf district.

A month ago she was taken to the Winnipeg hospital, where she underwent a critical operation for tumor on the brain.

The remains were brought home to the Endfield district, near Ellisboro, where the family reside on their farm, and in the presence of a large number of friends and relatives after a brief service in the home, then in the Lutheran church at Lemberg, taken to the cemetery near Neudorf and close to her father's home, where they were interred beside her daughter, who predeceased her a few years ago.

Besides her husband she leaves to mourn her seven sons, Carl, Philip, Ernest, John, Fred, Elmer and Burnnett.

The casket was covered with floral tributes.

All these years John was a farmer, either owning or renting land. He spent 26 years at Lemberg.

However, in September of 1935 Katharine became very ill and was diagnosed with a brain tumor. She went to Winnipeg, where she was operated on the 21st of September. She never recovered from this operation, passing away five days later 26 September 1935. She was buried at St. John's Lutheran Cemetery, SE 18-18-8 W2, Neudorf, Saskatchewan.



She travelled to Canada with her family, arriving in 1892, where the family homesteaded at Neudorf, North-West Territories. **Lizzie**, as she was called, grew up at Neudorf; however, after her two older brothers, Jacob and John, married in 1907, she decided it was time to leave home. She acquired a job at the hotel in Wolseley. It was there she first met Walter Moore who was a bartender at the hotel, although a bricklayer by trade according to their registration of marriage. He was born on 20 November 1884 in London, England,⁶ to Nettie Dadley and Walter Moore. Elizabeth and Walter were married at the Leland Hotel on 6 December 1910 by James Russell, officiating clergyman⁷. None of their family members were present. Elizabeth was twenty-one years old.

After they were married, they moved to Winnipeg, Manitoba, where their first son Norman was born on 27 September, 1911. Two years later Elsie was born on 4 April 1913. On 11 August 1914, another son, Walter George was born; however, he died in infancy. After the war broke out, Walter enlisted in the army in 1915⁸ and Elisabeth returned with her two children to Neudorf. At this time, it was discovered that she had tuberculosis, so she went to the sanatorium at Fort San.

Fort San was a primary sanatorium opened in 1917 due to the increase of tuberculosis (TB) in Canada at that time. This infectious disease is caused by a bacteria affecting the lungs creating a chronic cough with blood-containing mucous, fever, night sweats and weight loss.⁹ While TB has been around since antiquity and it is now uncommon in most of Canada, the United Kingdom and the United States, it is still prevalent in many countries in the world. A vaccine has been developed for it and others are being developed. Treatment of TB uses a combination of antibiotics to kill the bacteria now, but it is still difficult to eradicate, especially with the rise of drug-resistance strains in the 1980s, although it is still difficult. Back in Elisabeth's time, there was little known about it, and sunshine, eating well, resting and moderate exercising outdoors and sometimes "a range of often toxic medications."¹⁰

Elizabeth returned from the sanatorium to Neudorf after a time where Dr. Elliott came from Wolseley to give her regular check-ups. She decided to return to Winnipeg, when she felt well enough, and persuaded her younger brother, Philip, to go along and help with the children. He was 12 or 13 at the time.

Elizabeth stayed in Winnipeg for a while, but soon decided to return to Neudorf as the war was still on. A short time later, she decided to return again to Winnipeg. Tuberculosis, by this time, was beginning to get the better of her and she was gravely ill. Her mother and Mr. Schienbein traveled to Winnipeg to help her out.¹¹ A Mr. K. Schienbein owned land near them according to the RM map, and a Karl Schienbein was also Fred's the father-in-law, so he might have been the one who went with them.

After they returned home to Neudorf, it was learned Elizabeth had died on the 12 January in 1916 in the King Edward Hospital, Winnipeg, Manitoba,¹² at the age of 26. Her father, Karl, went to take custody of the children who were staying with a Mrs. Eger, likely a neighbour or friend.


Left: Death Notice of Elizabeth Moore¹³


Elizabeth was buried in section 79, lot 39, grave 0, at Brookside Cemetery, Winnipeg on 10 February 1916.¹⁴ Sadly there is no marker¹⁵.

Walter was discharged from the army on the 31st of August, 1916. He had received the British War Medal. However, he was known as "a drunkard" and he came back as far as Winnipeg, but had turned against the Germans. His children wanted to see him, and he wrote to them from time to time, but never came to visit them, although he did try "to obtain custody of them at one time."¹⁶

He was not established anywhere and failed to obtain custody. He had a sister in the United States who wrote them now and again. It is rumored Walter eventually returned to England, where he remarried, but nothing further has been learned about him. The children were raised by their grandparents at Neudorf.





NUMIDIA EMILY ASSMANN & PHILIP RINK

Numidia Emily Assmann, born 1 May 1892, S.S. Numidian, Atlantic Ocean;¹ married **Philip Rink**,² died 16 December 1927.³



Numidia Emily (sometimes spelled **Emilie**, also spelled **Amelie**⁴ or **Amelia**) **Assmann** (later **Assman**) was born 1 May 1892 to Karl Assmann (1858-1926) and Katharina Elisabeth (Lizzie) Erbach (1863-1945), aboard the S.S. Numidian on the Atlantic Ocean on its way to Canada. She was the second daughter born into the family. Her full name included the more feminine version of the name of the ship, though she was known as Emilie. The captain of the ship granted Emilie free passage for the rest of her life or the duration of the ship's life. On 9 May 1892, eight days after her birth, they sailed into the Port of Montreal, after which she travelled with her family to Neudorf, Saskatchewan. (For more information about the journey, see The History of the Assmann Family. Part 1.)

Emily grew up on the family farm on the SE 1/4 SE-20-19-8-W with her ten brothers and sisters, attending Baber School as they did. At home she was known as Miltz, a fond nickname. She was confirmed in Neudorf on 3 June 1906. At the age of eighteen, in 1910⁶, Emily married Philip Rink in Neudorf, Saskatchewan, Canada.

Philip Rink was the son of Philip Rink (1862-1899)⁷ and Margarethe Rink⁸ (1864-1952)⁹ born 1 June 1886 in Lutz, Volhynia, Russia. (His mother Margarethe's maiden last name is also Rink). Philip was christened on 2 June 1886 in Volhynia.¹⁰



Philip and Emilie resided at Neudorf for a time where their first son, Ernest was born in 1911. A second son, Karl was born in 1912, but he only survived for one day. Elsa (Elsie) was born in 1914, also at Neudorf, after which time they moved to Glenbush, where Richard arrived in 1916. Glenbush was about twenty kilometres from Bournemouth where Philip's brother William had homesteaded. They lived there for about three years.



Richard O. Rink was born on 3 August 1916 at Glenbush, Saskatchewan. About three years later, in 1919, the family moved to the Oakshela area.

On March 17, 1939 Richard Rink married **Freida Speidelsbach** and they took up farming north of Oakshela, where they raised their son Garry, who eventually took over the home farm with his wife and daughter.

Richard died on 21 December 1994 at Grenfell, Saskatchewan. After this, Freida moved to the Centennial Lodge in Broadview before making her new home at the Grenfell Pioneer Lodge in March 2002, following a major stroke, which left her with physical challenges and limited communication skills. They had four children, three of whom lived to adulthood.

Richard and Ida farmed in the Bradly district from 1948 until they semi-retired to Grenfell in 1980. He died 17 September 1993 at the Grenfell Union Hospital in Grenfell, Saskatchewan. Ida died on 10 October 2012 in the Wolseley Memorial Integrated Care Centre at the age of 90 years. At the time of her death, their offspring numbered eight grandchildren and seventeen great-grandchildren.

KARL (CARL) ASSMANN & (I) HELENA GOLLINGER & (II) SOPHIA BENDER

Karl Assmann (later changed the spelling to **Carl Assman**), born 20 November 1894 in Wolseley, North-West Territories, Canada;¹ died 15 July 1972 at Melville, Saskatchewan.²

He married on 19 March 1918 in Neudorf, Saskatchewan, **Helena Gollinger**, daughter of Joseph and Catherine (née Weber) Gollinger³. Helena was born 2 November 1900 in Tupper, Manitoba⁴; died 9 March 1921 at Killaly, Saskatchewan.⁵

Carl married on 5 June 1921 at Zion Lutheran Church, Neudorf,⁶ **Sophia Bender**, daughter of Philipp and Caroline (née Zaph) Bender.⁷ Sophia was born 10 May 1900 at Neudorf, North-West Territories;⁸ died 14 February 1979 at Melville, Saskatchewan⁹.



Carl Assman's exact birthdate is a bit of a mystery. His birth was registered twice in the Province of Saskatchewan. Many of our relatives will tell you his birthday was celebrated November 20th every year. Well, some time ago, a birth record was located; his birth was registered by his father, our great grandfather, Karl Assman, on 9 October 1896. He told the registrar the birth occurred November 1, 1894.

Then late last year, while looking for Assman birth records, I¹⁰ stumbled on another birth registration for Carl born 20 December 1894. This time, his birth was registered 20 June 1895 by a German Minister. The document is hard to read, but it looks like the last name of the minister is Streich. Well, I also have a scanned copy of Carl's confirmation record. Looks like Pastor H. Petschke indicated Karl (German spelling here) was confirmed at Ev[angelical] Luth[eran] St. Dreieinigkeits Kirche (Saint Trinity Church) of Neudorf, Saskatchewan, on 9 April 1909 and he was born 20 November 1894.¹¹

Many phone calls and emails have been made requesting a search of the archived Saint Trinity Lutheran Church records; however, requests turned up nothing. The exact date of Carl's birth isn't important so the date the family celebrated will be used.



Carl was the fifth child born to Karl and Katharina Elisabeth (née Erbach) Assmann. His name was registered as Charles Osman.¹² He was commonly called Charlie and later in life was referred to as Carl, as he preferred that spelling of his name.

Carl was confirmed in the Lutheran faith 9 April 1909 at the Evangelical Lutheran Saint Trinity Church, Neudorf, by Pastor H. Petschke. It is interesting to note the date of birth recorded on this document is 20 November 1894.¹⁴ Carl celebrated his birthday on November 20 according to his children. They do not know how his birthdate was confused or which date is correct, this one or the previous one.



The following was written by Mary Shpak (daughter) from memory:

"I remember my mom holding her German Bible with worn pages. She knelt with us kids at her bedside Chart for nightly prayers. She was a kind and godly mother that taught us how to behave and treat others with respect and dignity. Seldom was she idle, besides her home and family responsibly she would meet with neighbors and quilt donations for Lutheran Relief.

Sundays was always a day of rest. Church services were every Sunday at 3:00. It was usually preached in German and there was no Sunday school. We all attended regularly, snow, sleet or rain. My father after morning chores before breakfast went faithfully to the living room window pulled the sheers behind him and quietly prayed. Grace was said before meals blessing our food with thankfulness.

Our family attended Killaly St. John's Lutheran Church services every Sunday, sharing congregation pastoral resources with Christ Lutheran Church in Neudorf. In the early 1950s W. Riekert was the pastor and as teenagers Philip, Johnny and I attended 2 hour confirmation classes in Neudorf. We got there via a train.

Confirmations day was a solemn commitment for 18 confirmands by confidently giving testimony to the congregation when questioned by the pastor why we believe Jesus is Lord and the Bible is the true word of God, hence becoming a Lutheran church member. A verse sang on confirmation Sunday, 'Take my hand dear Father and lead thou me and at journey's end dwell with thee, alone I will not wonder one single day so do thou guide my footsteps on life's rough way'. I am thankful to my parents, pastor and church for continuing their faith journey of Christian heritage from generation to generation. Was it a coincidence that when Pastor Riekert transferred to Trinity Lutheran Church, Regina, that my future husband Don was also confirmed at Trinity prior to our marriage?

Leaving farm life in 1963 my parents moved to Melville enjoying city living. Father was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. Carl died on at age 77 on 15 July 1972. Sophie died in 1979 at 79 years of age."





JOHN BERNHARDT ASMAN

John was born on the family farm at Killaly, February 2, 1938 to Karl and Sophia (nee Bender) Assman. He took his schooling at Killaly and was confirmed at Christ Lutheran Church, Neudorf. John left home at an early age, working at various jobs. He worked for Weston's Bakery in Regina for a time and then moved to Vancouver where he was a driver-salesman and later established his own bread route on Vancouver Island. He then returned to Saskatchewan and farmed the family farm at Killaly. He enjoyed farming and helping his neighbours whenever he could. In the off-seasons, John travelled and he spent time in Mexico, Australia, Cuba and England. Due to ill health, John left the farm and worked at several jobs in Melville. Later he moved to Yorkton for a short time and then returned to live at Neudorf. He again returned to Yorkton, but due to ill health was not able to work full time, so he took part-time employment at SARCAN. It was important to John that he be employed and he always enjoyed his association with co-workers. John had a great sense of humor and at one time worked as a clown for the Last Chance Service Station in Regina.

Johnny leaves a legacy of a kind, sociable, loving man. He was a man who loved to bring smiles to people's faces with his good sense of humor. Johnny was especially appreciated by the Mental Health Association, Yorkton Psychiatric Centre, SARCAN and Drop-In Centre staff where he was in their care for many years. He will be remembered for lifting the spirits of those that he knew and loved. His dedication and loyalty will be missed. Johnny passed away Wednesday, August 16, 1995 at the age of 57 years.

John was predeceased by his parents; four brothers; Herman in infancy, Alfred, Clifford and Philip; brothers-in-law, Ed Piller and Ed Tank and a nephew; Bobby Austin. Maria (Mary) Caroline Assman was born 2 February 1938, Killaly, Saskatchewan, Canada, to Karl Assmann (1894-1972) and Sophia Bender (1900-1979). She married 11 October 1958 at Killaly, Saskatchewan, to **William Donald Shpak** (10 January 1937-21 June 2016). She was known as Mary throughout her life.


Mary is the youngest of a family of 11 and is the twin sister to her brother John (no longer living). She had 5 sisters (only 1 still living as November 2024) and 4 other brothers, all of whom have passed.

Mary attended Killaly Elementary and High School and went to the Killaly St. John's Lutheran Church services every Sunday. As she became older, she attended confirmation classes in Neudorf, travelling there by train.

As a young child and teen her playmates were her brothers since her sisters were much older and most had already moved away from home. A childhood game played by Mary and her siblings was to take the buggy or the sleigh in the winter, up the hill on the farmyard by the well and ride down. The kids would take the shaft off of the normally horse drawn buggy, attach a rope for a steering mechanism, climb on and the force of gravity would give them a thrill as they gained speed down the hill. The children had no fear of veering off into the nearby dugout or crashing into the fence. They often ran into the fence and tore their clothes. It is a miracle no one was severely injured. The neighbours used to say, "That farm has no grass. There are so many children tearing around the yard."


Mary loved horses and rode whenever she could. She recalls the numerous times she was bucked off or trampled by the horses without more than a scratch. Once she was run over by the manure sleigh, which was a close call. Again, another miracle she wasn't seriously hurt. When Shelley, Mary's oldest daughter, was three years of age, Mary was horseback riding near Regina when her leg got caught in the stirrup and she was dragged. She ended up with a broken arm and there doesn't seem to be many stories about her riding after that time. That may have been the end of riding since she now had a child.

Mary left home about age 18 and moved to Regina and roomed with her sister Emma and her girlfriend, Shirley Brown. She worked at General Films in Regina with her sister Emma. I don't know if working at a film processing business early in her life had anything to do with Mary's love of picture taking, but she loves taking photographs. The family teases her about "couch pictures". At family gatherings, Mary insists on everyone sitting on the couch while she takes a photograph. 




Mary married William Donald Shpak on 11 October 1958 at Killaly.

William Donald Shpak was born 10 January 1937 to Maxim Shpak (1868-1942) and Anna Rostotski (1873-1958) on the farm at West Bend, Saskatchewan. He went by Donald or Don throughout his life. Don lived in Foam Lake, nearby, until he was the age of 3. The family then moved to live on the farm with Walter's parents, Maxim and Anne who lived four miles northeast of West Bend.

They raised two daughters.

The following are excerpts from Don Shpak's story....

One Saturday night, Don accompanied his friend to the Trianon Ballroom, 1850 Smith Street, Regina, where he met Mary Assman's sister Emma. Freddy Chorney took Emma to the dance, but for some reason, Don and his friend gave Emma a ride home that night. The next day, Don went back to Emma's where he was introduced to Mary. Mary's recollection is Emma introduced her to Don August 15, 1957. He was the only boyfriend she had. That memorable day, Don can remember Mary was washing clothes; she was wearing leopard print slacks. The rest is history, Emma was no longer of any interest to Don, Mary was.

Don worked at the Post Office picking up mail from the street mailboxes and delivering parcels. While courting, Don bought a black and white TV (1 channel) and let Emma and Mary keep it at their place. Of course he visited every night, so they watched TV together.

Don and Mary continued to date and were engaged at the wedding of Don's cousin, Steve. The wedding of Steve Rogoz to Doris Vachniuc was February 1, 1958. Mary's birthday is February 2, so Don may have proposed after midnight. I'm not sure, but Mary recalls the engagement on her birthday, February 2.

Without Mary knowing, Don was confirmed in the Lutheran faith at Trinity Lutheran Church, Ottawa Street, Regina while they were dating.

They were married October 11 of that same year, 1958. The following is a newspaper article announcing the marriage:

Marriage vows were exchanged between Mary Caroline Assman and William Donald Shpak of Regina in St. John's Lutheran Church at Killaly on Saturday, October 11. The ceremony was performed by Rev. I. Hohm of Melville. The church was decorated with red and white carnations and pansies, and organist Victor Eberley accompanied Mrs. Hohm when she sang "O Perfect Love".

The bride is the youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Karl Assman of Killaly, and the groom is the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Shpak of West Bend.

Given in marriage by her father the bride was charming in gown of white net and lace over silk, with lace bodice finished with lily point sleeves. Her chapel veil misted from a dainty crown and she carried a bouquet of red roses and white carnations.

She was attended by her sisters, Mrs. Ernest (Frieda) Sastaunik of Melville as matron of honour, and bridesmaids, Emma Assman, a sister, and Marie Shpak, the groom's sister.

The attendants wore waltz length gowns of blue with matching feather headdresses and carried yellow daisies. The groom and his attendants, Eddie Rogoza (cousin of Don) of Melfort, the bride's

twin brother Johnny, all wore suits in charcoal shade. Out of town guests included the groom's parents and sister from West Bend, Mr. and Mrs. Marv Shpak of Barrie, Ontario, and Miss Vernetta Hahn (bride's sister) of Winnipeg.

A supper was held in the Rainbow Hall for about 90 guests, given by the bride's parents. Bridal table decorations included a lovely three tier wedding cake flanked by candles and flowers. A toast was proposed by Rev. Holm and responded to by the groom. In the evening a dance attended by approximately 275 friends and relatives was held, with music supplied by Piller's Orchestra. Lunch was served. A week later, on Saturday October 18, a second reception was held at Edmore Hall, near West Bend (where the groom's parents lived), when approximately 150 guests were present.

"Toronto Street - Married, 1 kitchen (no sink), 1 bedroom, TV 1837 Osler Street - 2nd floor, 1 kitchen, 1 bedroom, 2 months, shared bathroom.

? Osler Street - 2nd floor, kitchen, living room, shared bathroom.

2232 Rose Street - main floor, living room, kitchen access to basement laundry, shared upstairs bathroom, occupancy 18 renters \$67.00 /month. Duties, hallways and bathroom clean up and collecting rent.

2338 Smith Street - 2nd floor veranda and 1 big room, shared bathroom.

2142 Scarth Street - 2nd floor, 3 rooms, shared upstairs bathroom- George Myrna Metrov. Shelley was born 1961. Washer in basement, hung clothes outside, no dryer.



Brother, Clifford, boarded with us from 1962-68 during winter layoffs as a gravel truck driver. He paid \$2 a day board and room.

1962-1968. Worked until 2 months before Shaylinn was born. My duties were typing invoices and correspondence. I loved my job. I resigned from General Films and was employed at Tees & Persee, Consignment wholesale. The wages were higher."

315 Royal Street, first home, 1962 (Shelley in front)

Don wanting to provide for his wife built a house in the 300 block of Royal Street in Regina in about 1962. While they lived there a second daughter was born, Shay (1968). One week after Shay was born, they moved to Yorkton, Saskatchewan. While they were there they rented a duplex for a short time and again built a house. Don was working for the Provincial Government and was transferred there. He was a labour standards officer at the time.

Mary's memories: "Rented a duplex first, 2-574 Circlebrook Drive. Built our own house 87 Cedarwood Crescent in 1969.

What a busy time. Birth of baby, packing, moving, unpacking, farewell parties at Frieda's and Doris Rogoz's, birthday party for Shelley. All in June.

Moved July 1st. Ernie helped with a Uhaul. Don traveled a lot often stayed away some nights, his territory was Hudson Bay to Whitewood.

Owned my first car, 1964 Ford Falcon. I was employed during summer at a government department issuing car licenses and a couple of weeks as a receptionist at the Yorkton Court House. Filled in for staff taking vacations. Otherwise I enjoyed being a stay-at-home mom in Yorkton. We attended St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Yorkton.

Relocated back to Regina in 1972. Transferred back because there was no travel involved for Don outside of Regina."

Don retired from the Government in 1987 at the age of 50. Mary worked in Regina for the Provincial Government as well in the Health Department, Communicable Disease section. She retired in 1996.

Don and Mary were active with their church their whole lives. They volunteered their time and talents in many ways. Don always wore a suit for work and church on Sunday. He wasn't concerned about changing into work clothes to do odd jobs around the house. Mary would scold him for working in his good clothes. Occasionally he would mow the lawn on a Sunday after church in his suit. I'm sure the neighbours talked about that.

Memories of Don, from daughter Shelley:

"Don had always been a very handy man. There was nothing he couldn't do (according to me, his oldest daughter) including, plumbing, electrical, construction, etc. What I remember most is him coming home for lunch and working at home during his lunch break. He would put up a strip of wallpaper for example over the lunch hour in his suit, of course. At their 25th anniversary celebration their church friends portrayed Don as wearing a suit with a screwdriver in his pocket. The skit showed Don attending a church service wearing his suit. He stopped in his tracks, somewhere in the service, pulled the screwdriver out of his pocket to tighten a loose screw. (I don't remember if this is the exact way it went, but I hope you get the idea about his attention to detail and willingness to assist in any way he could use his talents.)"

Both Don and Mary enjoyed corresponding by email to many friends and relatives. Don particularly liked keeping up with the latest technology, i.e., cellular phones, sophisticated landline phones, computers, DVD players, satellite TV, and the like. Don had a wide array of tools for all of his handy work. To his daughter's dismay, he is slowly gave them to his son-in-law, Brent (husband of Shelley) filing up their garage.

Don and Mary traveled a lot. When their children were young, they took summer vacations sometimes camping (This was not a favourite thing for Don, although he liked to fish.) but most often traveling south of the border by car.

Don was always determined to get there, wherever where was, ignoring the sights along the way. Mary on the other hand wanted to stop at all the touristy places along the route. As a kid Shelley remembered staying at Motel 6 or Super 8, an economical overnight stay.

Shelley Dawn Shpak, born 20 June 1961 Regina, Saskatchewan, to Maria (Mary) Caroline Assman (1958) and Donald Shpak (1937- 2016). Married 1 June 2001 Brent James Kloczko; died 25 May 2024.



Shelley, the oldest of two daughters of Maria (Mary) Caroline Assman and Donald Shpak, grew up in Regina, until the family moved to Yorkton in 1969 and then returned to Regina in 1972, where she finished her elementary and high school education. In the summer times the family went on trips by car or camping to places in Canada or often to the United States to explore places.

After high school, Shelley attended NAIT (Northern Alberta Institute of Technology) in Edmonton where she studied tailoring. In 1979, Shelley began her thirty-year plus career with the Regina Police Service in communications.

Shelley married Brent James Kloczko on 1 June 2001, and they resided in Regina.

Although Shelley passed before she could write this chapter on her life, she had many interests throughout her life, including scrapbooking, quilting, and genealogical research to name a few.

And while there are gaps in the recounting of her amazing contributions and activities, as she had not written her history before she passed, there are some nuggets we can glean from the eulogies written for her celebration of life that touch on some of her most passionate pursuits. These follow below.

Eulogy from Shelley's childhood friend: Heather Crawford Hughes

I've known Shelley since we were babies. But I really got to know her when we were 3 years old. It was her birthday party. And did we party, blowing up balloons through straws and dancing. As neighbours we saw a lot of each other. Going to each other's birthday party, skating at the rink in the field outside our back yard until our little feet were blocks of ice, running through a sprinkler on a hot summer day and holding hands with anticipation going to our first day of school. My mother's observation that Shelley was a serious child but always, always polite and proper.

One day Kathy, Shelley's cousin, was babysitting her. Shelley decided that she wanted to venture and

came over to my place, unbeknownst to Kathy. It gave Kathy a scare as she didn't know where she was. That was when we knew if Shelley wanted to do something she had the determination to do it.

As young women we even had apartments across the hall from one another. We were always together. One weekend we decided to take a road trip to Minot to get household items for our places. We shopped until her car was full. Upon our return we had to stop at the border not realizing that our spending spree could cost us. Not to worry, Shelley knew the border guard and we sail on through.

At that age we lived without a care - sunbathing without sunscreen, trying different foods mostly Taco Time, playing lots of backgammon, which Shelley usually won and drinking a nice cold beer. We would even go line dancing; Shelley was the expert and didn't miss a beat.

Our lives were sometimes separated during our friendship. She moved to Yorkton for several years when she was young. Then as a young woman she went to NAIT in Edmonton to study tailoring. Every time she returned to Regina it was like our friendship was reaffirmed. When I got married, Shelley was, of course, my maid of honour. She made my wedding dress which was absolutely beautiful. Then my married life took me to Saskatoon. But as Shelley had so eloquently told me 'A strong friendship doesn't need daily conversation. Doesn't always need togetherness, as long as the relationship lives in the heart, true friends will never part.'

Our friendship was strong, and we would do anything for each other. I know Shelley loved me and I loved her in return.

One day Shelley gave me a call. There was excitement and joy in her voice like I've never heard before. She said that she had met this wonderful man named Brent. She told me their first date was the best as they talked all night and drank wine until sunrise. That was when I knew she was in love. Then her next chapter began.

Eulogy on Shelley's Career with the Regina Police Service:

My name is Maureen Schmidt and I had the pleasure of working with, for and alongside Shelley for over 25 years. After our retirements, we have maintained a close friendship and looking back; between work, travel for work, car drives across the province and friendship I spent more time with Shelley than any other woman on this planet. So many memories.

Thank you, Brent, for asking me on behalf of all her colleagues to speak today about Shelley's career. It is an honour.

Shelley was a civilian member of the Regina Police Service for over thirty years. She was hired in 1979 and worked intermittently in different roles including Switchboard, Records and CPIC. In 1988, Shelley became a civilian dispatcher which set the foundation for the remainder of her career. Dispatching is basically telling police officers where to go - and she was a natural.

In 1993, Shelley was part of the Regina Police Service Communication Officer Class #1 and later that year became the Communications Coordinator. Goodbye shiftwork.

In 1995, Shelley was promoted to Communications Manager. Managing a 24/7 public safety centre is very stressful and Shelley was up for the challenge. Her development of this position and its responsibilities has paved the way for her successors.

Relationships were key to Shelley's many achievements. Development of her supervisory and front-line staff was a priority. Working closely with both sworn and civilian members; agencies such as Fire, EMS, Emergency Management, Sask911, industry experts and contacts from across North America, Shelley strategically managed and implemented several complex communication and radio systems that remain a fundamental part of today's Communication Centre. Her involvement

with Public Safety Professional Associations ensured that she remained up to date with technology trends and best call centre practices.

Shelley's vision, knowledge, leadership, technical expertise, professionalism and diligence awarded her much success in her career. Her dry sense of humour and wit were greatly appreciated. Humour was definitely necessary when a police officer would attend her office with a cellphone or pager that had once again been accidentally dropped in the toilet. Shelley handled it all in stride. Shelley did have a couple of workplace pet peeves; 1. People who chewed gum while talking and 2. People who sweated profusely in meetings after a lunch hour Boot Camp Workout. I can admit that I was guilty of both; much to Shelley's chagrin.

There is no way to recognize everything Shelley accomplished during her career. Her legacy speaks for itself. She was always a very proud member of the Regina Police Service. Maintaining a work/life balance was a priority which allowed Shelley to transition easily into retirement in 2013. She committed to new projects, volunteering and education always sharing her talents with others.

Thank you, Shelley, for always remaining true to yourself. You will be missed.



Shelley as a Quilter:

Shelley was a quilter for many years, a member of the Prairie Piecemakers Quilters' Guild and with other groups and on her own making quilts for fundraisers, to give to charity, shows and sales, and as gifts for loved ones. The Guild's charity arm, Connecting Threads annually donates about 50 charity quilts annually to groups working with cancer patients, premature babies, sick kids, families in need and those fleeing domestic violence (donating more than 1000 quilts over 8 or 9 years). Shelley was dedicated to being part of this, and also created award winning quilts.

Eulogy on Shelley's Quilting:

Our friend Shelley is a quilter whose creativity and passion enriched our lives with warmth and beauty inside and out.

Shelley found true joy in the simple pleasures of quilting—the rhythmic hum of her sewing machines, or as Brent would call it the varoom, varoom factory, Shelley's basement became a sewing sanctuary, filled with like minded ladies the basement was a tactile pleasure of fabric beneath our fingertips, a place of industrial intelligence (gossip) and the endless possibilities that lay within her vast stash of fabrics.

Shelley was not just a quilter; she was a master of the quilting language, fluent in the intricate dialect of HST's, WOF's, FQ's and the precision of the elusive $\frac{1}{4}$ inch seam. Each glued stitch she made was a testament of her dedication and love for quilting.

And who could forget our legendary road trips in search of the finest fabrics and sewing machines? With a twinkle in Shelley's eye and a sense of adventure in her heart, we embarked on countless journeys, traversing highways, and byways in pursuit of that elusive bolt of fabric or perfect featherweight machine. Each excursion was an opportunity to discover how much fabric we could fit in a vehicle. We oohed and awed over that treasured piece of recently purchased fabric. That fabric will always remain in our stash as it is too pretty to cut up.

One of the many facets of Shelley's quilting legacy was her dedication to quilting for charity. With each quilt she created for Connecting Threads, she shared not only her skill and creativity but also her warmth and compassion. Whether it was making quilts for newborns, or for those facing illness or hardship, Shelley donated several hundred quilts. Shelley selflessly gave of herself to bring comfort and joy to others.

But it wasn't just strangers who benefited from Shelley's generous spirit. Her family and friends were also the recipients of her love-infused quilts. Each stitch was a gesture of affection, each quilt a tangible expression of her deep bonds with those she held dear. From cozy lap quilts to intricate bedspreads, Shelley poured her heart into every project, creating cherished heirlooms that will be treasured for generations to come.

Shelley was a certified genealogist, educated at the NIGS, Canada, Research Canadians, specializing in Saskatchewan, Record agent for local archives and libraries. Her time periods specialities were from the 1600s to 2000's in Ukraine and Canada, particularly Saskatchewan, working with emigration and immigration and naturalization searches. She was registered with Genealogists website (<https://www.genealogists.com/pro>) as a professional generalist offering paid research services to clients. She was a member of the Saskatchewan genealogical society, particularly the Regina Branch where she also served on the board.

Eulogy of Shelley as a genealogist by Judith Silverthorne

Shelly and I shared a deep passion for genealogical research, particularly homing in on our Assman side of the family. Our grandfathers were brothers, and we took great pride and joy in tracking down our ancestors together. She as the certified genealogist and I as the writer decided we would team up to write our family history, thinking we could finish the research and the book in a year or two at most. Eight years in, we still had lots more to do but decided to publish what we already had for the time being.

or no longer existed. The cemeteries were even trickier to locate. Some were gone or abandoned. Sometimes we found ourselves traipsing across pastures and wrangling our way through deep bushes to find long grown over cemeteries and half-buried headstones. We took tons of photos of our searches and our triumphs! We had a lot of luck and fascinating finds too, and Shelley would say, "See our ancestors want us to find them." I agreed. Things happened miraculously at times!

Along the way, we had a few wild and wonderful adventures, especially when we travelled overseas to see where our ancestors had once lived. In what is now Ukraine, several generations of our relatives spent almost a hundred years in an area once known as Galicia, Austria, then moved a few kilometres across the border into what was then Volhynia, Russia.

Shelley and I enjoyed every minute of driving the highways and old country lanes in search of little, tiny places that had housed our ancestors. Many of the villages in Ukraine were difficult to find, had been engulfed into larger places, had been renamed

Along the way in Ukraine, a kind-hearted soul thought they had found a long lost relative for us, surmising that they had changed their last name to avoid racial persecution. We came prepared with gifts for them from Canada. This lovely, very poor family welcomed us into their home with great ceremony, preparing a huge meal and guiding us throughout the area even though they didn't speak a word of English. When we found out later, they were not related at all, we laughed at how reverential and excited we all were when we thought we were. We still stay in touch with some of them, a family connection of another kind.

In Germany, we rented a little blue Renault for a few days. A snappy little car with a few operating snafus...we found out later it was known for having a tricky gear shift! After trying for ages—pushing down, pulling up, looking for buttons, twisting this way and that—we finally succumbed to asking someone how to get the car into reverse to get out of the parking lot! Successful at last, Shelley drove, and I navigated. We loved zipping around at 120 km/hour on the freeways.

We had no other problems at all, until we were driving on some narrow winding lanes deep in a little valley and came to a crossroads. My navigation skills were hampered because we had no cell phone reception. And no paper maps. We stopped the car to consider our situation. But we couldn't get the car going again!! It didn't matter what we did, the car would not start! No car manual in the glove compartment to help either!

After a long time of trying everything we could think of, we accidentally got it going. Turns out that when the motor's not running, the steering wheel locks. You simply CANNOT turn the key to start the car again if you don't pull the steering wheel out a bit. Somehow, through sheer exasperation, we must have wiggled the steering wheel enough to finally get going again!

Sometimes we took the train, and one day we had the bright idea to take an express one to our destination only a few minutes away. We loaded up all our luggage and set off. The fast train only made a couple of automatic stops along the way...no announcements of impending arrivals, no one seemed to pull any cords to indicate departing. As we unwittingly neared our station, the train kind of slowed a little, but didn't come to a stop. By the time we realized we'd reached our destination, we didn't have a chance to move. We were in the back of the coach hemmed in by luggage and people. The train picked up speed again and we whipped by our station. When the train finally stopped at the end of the line, we had to take another train back, but there was only a slow one available. It took us over an hour to get where we needed to go. So much for speeding up our research!

Even with the many learning experiences in travel whether overseas or here in Canada, Shelley and I had so many grand adventures and shared the thrill of getting to know our ancestors. We managed to make many important genealogical breakthroughs, and met some interesting people, including some bonafide relatives who were still living in the village in Germany where our ancestors had first ventured from in the 1700s.

We cherished our good fortune in having magical moments, finding nuggets of confirmation and new paths to lead us onward in our research. Each time, Shelley would say, "See, our ancestors want us to find them." I agreed. I'm sure ancestors did and still do. And now she is one of them.

And, as I finish the work on our huge family history book which we set out to share with our expansive family, I am forever grateful that Shelley and I shared such wonderful adventures and for all that I've learned from her. Because of her vision, perseverance, and willingness to share her amazing talents, she has left us with a remarkable legacy that future generations will treasure for years to come.

Shelley passed on 25 May 2024 at Regina, Saskatchewan.

As the sun rose on the morning of Saturday, May 25, 2024 while holding hands with Brent, Shelley Dawn Kloczko late of Regina, Saskatchewan passed away peacefully at the age of 62 after a 2-year battle with glioblastoma.

Shelley was predeceased by her father William Don Shpak; as well as numerous uncles and aunts. She is survived by her husband Brent; mother Mary; her sister Shay; nieces Stephanie, Danna and Tori; as well as numerous relatives and friends.

FRIEDRICH (FRED) ASSMANN & ELIZABETH SCHIENBEIN

Friedrich (Fred) Assmann, born 17 February 1899;¹ married **Elizabeth Schienbein**;² died 8 December 1952, Melville, Saskatchewan, Canada.³



Friedrich (Fred) Assmann (later Assman), the son of Karl Assmann (1858-1926) and Katharina Elisabeth Erbach (1863-1945), was born 17 February 1899, at Neudorf, Assiniboia, Northwest Territories.

Fred, who was often called Fritz (which is the usual German short form of the name Friedrich; Fred usually stands for Alfred in German), attended Baber School in the Neudorf District. (For more information on Baber School see his parent's chapter Karl Assmann & Katharina Elisabeth Erbach.) He was confirmed in 1913.⁴

He married at the age of 22 to Elisabeth Schienbein in the St. John's Lutheran Church in Neudorf, Saskatchewan. The witnesses to their marriage were Katherine Schienbein (likely her sister), Karl Schienbein (perhaps a cousin), Heinrich Assman (Fred's brother) and Margarite Erbach (perhaps a cousin).⁵

Elisabeth Schienbein was born 16 March 1902 at Neudorf, Saskatchewan to Karl Schienbein and Katharina Hahn. She was the second oldest from a family of five children, with two sisters and two brothers.

After Fred and Elisabeth married, they moved to Grayson where they farmed and raised their five children, Karl, Fronie, Wilfred, Arnold, and Irwin. Fred was on the church council for the Grayson Church for many years.

They retired to Melville in 1949, and attended St. Paul's Church in Melville, Saskatchewan.

Fred passed away in Melville, Saskatchewan Canada on 8 December 1952. Elizabeth lived out her days with her son Irvin and his family in Grayson, Saskatchewan. She died 21 February 1987 in Melville and was buried next to Fred in the Melville Municipal Cemetery.





HEINRICH (HENRY) ASSMANN & PHILIPENA ULMER

Heinrich Assmann, born 4 April 1901;¹ married **Philipena Ulmer**;² died 12 January 1979.³



Henry Assmann (later Assman) was born on 4 April 1901 at Neudorf, Assiniboia, Northwest Territories, Canada to Karl Assmann (1858-1926) and Katharina Elisabeth (Lizzie) Erbach (1863-1945), most likely at home on the farm as many of his other siblings had been born. Henry was baptized on 20 April 1901. He grew up on the farm, attending Baber School with his siblings. He was confirmed in 1915.⁴

1926 was a significant year for Henry. Sixteen days after he turned twenty-five (4 April) his father died (20 April). His father bequeathed him some land including the SE 1/4 of 9-19-8 W2⁵ and the north half of NW 4-19-8 W2. It is surmised that the south half of this quarter was where the home buildings were located, and his mother was still living there. A condition for having the land also meant he had to pay \$1500 in three annual payments of \$500 to his mother starting one year after he came into possession of the property.

By 23 November 1926, Henry married Philipena Ulmer in Neudorf, Saskatchewan. She was the daughter of Gottlieb Ulmer and Maria Frick, born to them on 7 August in 1904. They farmed at Neudorf for many years where their four children were born: Clarence, Raymond Elmer, Fern, and Glen. At one point they moved with their son, Glen, to Kitchener, Ontario (where two of their adult children lived and also other relatives), but returned west to Neudorf (back to the farm and sometimes in the town of Neudorf for the winters) and later settled in Grenfell.

Henry died on the 12th of January 1979 in Grenfell and was buried in the St. John's Lutheran Cemetery at Neudorf, Saskatchewan. Philipena lived with her son Glen in Grenfell until her death 11 February 1989. She was laid to rest beside her husband in the St. John's Lutheran Cemetery at Neudorf.



PHILIP ASSMANN & ANNA SCHÜTZ

Philip Assmann, born 26 April 1903, Neudorf, Assiniboia, Northwest Territories; married **Anna Schütz**,¹ died 11 December 1991.²



Philip Assmann (later Assman) was born 26 April 1903 at Neudorf, Assiniboia, Northwest Territories to Karl Assmann (1858-1926) and Katharina Elisabeth (Lizzie) Erbach (1863-1945).

Philip attended Baber School for approximately six years. He travelled three miles cross-country to get to school. For three summers, Mr. Goldstein was the teacher. He was also the town photographer and stenographer. One year Philip was the only student, and as they had to keep the school open by law, Mr. Goldstein would arrive in the morning to give Philip his assignments and then leave to take pictures or do other duties for the town. He would return at the end of the day to see how Philip was progressing.

Philip's school career ended a few years later after he was wrongly accused of some misdemeanour by a different teacher (not Mr. Goldstein) and given the strap across his hands. He was unable to use his hands for several weeks and when he finally returned to school, he lasted one more day and gave it up for good.



When Philip was thirteen years old, he reluctantly agreed to accompany his sister Elisabeth to Winnipeg to help her look after her children. While waiting for the train to come into the station, he was approached by a Mr. Borac, who offered to cut his hair. It had become very long as it was not often in those days to make it to town for a haircut. They eventually made it to Winnipeg, although Philip does not recall any direct circumstances of the return trip.

In 1927 on December 4th, Philip married Anna Schütz (Schuetz) at the home of John Schütz, father of the bride; Reverend Krahn officiated. Anna Schütz, fondly known as Annie, was born 23 July 1908 at Neudorf, Saskatchewan, to Johann (John) Schütz and Katharina Mohr.³


Philip and Annie farmed at Neudorf on land south of his parent's farm, where their three children were born.

They remained there until their retirement in the fall of 1952, the year their son Elroy married and took over the family farm. Philip became a painter and they lived in Melville until their deaths. They owned two quarter at home and three quarters about four miles away.





Like his brothers and sisters before and after him, Adolf attended Baber School, where he was fortunate to continue until he achieved grade seven.⁵

In 1916 the family was living on 19-8-2nd, according to the census taken then, and only the younger children from son Carl on were living there at this time.⁶ Only the township and range were listed, no parcel description, so most likely this was SE 1/4 of 9-19-8 2nd, which his father

had homesteaded in 1893 and he still owned in 1920.⁷ By 1920 Adolf's father owned other quarters - NE 1/4-17-1 9-8-W2, and both the NW and SE 1/4s of 9-19-8 W2nd. Adolf's father had obtained even more quarters by the time he died.

Adolf's confirmation took place on his fifteenth birthday, 20 March 1921, Palm Sunday, at the Evangelical Christ Lutheran Church in Neudorf, Saskatchewan with Pastor E. Schmok officiating.


Adolf Assman as a young man⁹

Adolf was known for his easy-going manner, his sense of humour, and his kindness.

He married Maria Elisabeth (Lizzie) Krahnenbil on the 13th of February 1930 in Neudorf, Saskatchewan, Canada, just a few weeks before he turned twenty-five.

They were married on NW ¼-Sec 32-Twp 19-R8- W of 2nd according to marriage registration form, License No: 1549A. This location might be wrong, as the next quarter south belonged to them in 1926 (NE 29), but this one in 1920 was held by their neighbour W. Arndt. They could have been married at their neighbours. It's unknown who owned the place before this time.

Rev W. F. Krahn of Trinity Lutheran Church officiated at their wedding. Louis Senft was the best man. He was Lizzie's uncle, brother to her stepmother Barbara Senft (Krahnenbil). Emma Assman was the bridesmaid. Emma was Adolf's uncle Jake and aunt Carrie's daughter, so Adolf's cousin.

Maria Elisabeth Krahenbil¹³ was the daughter of Emil Krahenbil and Maria (Mary) Elisabeth Löwenberg. She was born on 10 December 1908 in Grayson, Saskatchewan, Canada.¹⁴ Sometimes her name was spelled Marie Elisabeth on various documents, and even Elisabeth Mary on her Confirmation Certificate, as she usually went by Lizzie (and often said her first name was Elizabeth). She was the oldest of three children, a fourth having died as an infant at six weeks old, prior to Lizzie's birth. Lizzie was named the same as this older sister in commemoration of her. Her family lived at Grayson on the SE 1/4-18-21-05 W2nd.

Lizzie spent her early life in Grayson. After her brother Albert was born in 1913, the family moved to Canora for a couple of years where her father worked at the grain elevator.¹⁸ Following this, they moved to Neudorf and lived about one third of a mile from her grandfather Adam Krahenbil's farm.

Lizzie, as the oldest daughter came to be called, started school there in 1916. School lasted year-round, with six weeks off in the summer. As there were no older brothers, Lizzie was usually taken out of school for three weeks in the fall to help with harvesting. She walked a mile and a half every day to the Piller school, even in the winter, unless it was extremely cold. Every day her mother had hot food waiting for her in the warming oven above the wood heated stove, which is the first place Lizzie headed when she arrived home. One year she went to the Baber school

after Easter. She attended there for six or seven months until Christmas time, and then resumed classes at the Piller school for the rest of her school years.

In June of 1919, her younger sister Emma Clara was born. Six months later, Lizzie's mother had to travel to Rochester, Minnesota, to the Mayo Clinic for a goiter operation. Although it was a success, unfortunately Mary Krahenbil succumbed to influenza on the 31st of January 1920.

Although young Clara was cared for by an aunt and an uncle, the housework and chores fell on Lizzie's shoulders. Before she went to school each day, she made breakfast for her father and little brother, did the dishes, made beds, and milked the cows outside in the pen. Lunches also had to be made as school was too far away for Lizzie to come home and cook for her father at noontime. Lizzie basically took over her mother's work after she died. Understandably, when her father Emil remarried, she recalls being upset when she was no longer the chief cook and bottle washer. She felt she had been thrust aside by her stepmother, Barbara Senft.

In 1924 the family moved to NW ½ of Section 22 in the Neudorf area, where her two stepsisters, Ella and Esther, were born. This was also close to where Adolf and Lizzie later bought a farm.

Lizzie was confirmed on 13 April 1924 at the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Neudorf.

After Adolf and Lizzie's marriage, they resided on the Assmann family farm, where Adolf had been living and taking care of his mother. His father had died four years previously and Adolf and Lizzie stayed to work the farm and continued to care for his mother. At the time of his father's death, Adolf had also been bequeathed two quarters of land, with stipulations as follows from his dad's will:

"To Adolf, NW 9-19-8 W2 and NE 17-19-8 W2²², when Adolf reaches the age of 25 and provided he pays Katharina Elisabeth Assman \$1000 in three annual payments of equal denominations beginning one year after coming into possession of the property."




Besides somewhat cramped conditions with their growing family, Lizzie felt a bit like a servant, catering to Adolf's mother, who seemed quite demanding and had high expectations of what her daughter-in-law needed to do for her.

They eventually bought their own farm two miles away NW 27-19-R8-W2. They ended up being across the road from Lizzie's sister Clara.

There the rest of the family was born: Raymond (1940), Joan (1943), Jean (1945), Norma (1947), and Marlene (1950).



In 1961, Adolf and Lizzie sold their three-quarters of land at Neudorf and moved to a full section of land at Grenfell. The location of the house was on NE 1/4 9-16-8 W2nd. The barn, however, was on the next section: SE 1/4-16-16-9 W2nd.

The circumstances were such that one of the previous owners, Sir Richard Lake, a Lieutenant Governor of Saskatchewan, had purchased the road allowance between the two quarters. The road coming from east had to end anyway, because there was a lake in the way on the property. This was not a practice that was normally allowed; however, it remains part of the land deed to this day.

At this time there were still the five youngest members of the family at home: Raymond, Joan, Jean, Norma, Marlene. The others had married or struck out on their own. These younger ones attended Summerhill country school until it closed in 1964. Then the youngest girls had to board in Grenfell for their high school years.

Adolf and Lizzie farmed the land with their son Raymond, and the younger daughters helped with other farm and household work. They lived at the farm until they retired into a newly built house in the town of Grenfell in 1973. When they moved into it in 1974, they turned their farm over to their son Raymond.

During his life, Adolf was heavily involved in the church board or school board, sometimes both at the same time. Some years were really tough for the family to survive. When Adolf started farming in the 1930s and 1940s, he was only being paid 2 and 3 cents for a bushel of wheat. Although some years the crops weren't good because of the dry conditions, there were many years when there were bumper crops, but there was no market. When they got a Wheat Board set up, this gave them something a little more stable for income though still not high amounts. Back then, Adolf sold a cow for \$70 and now they're even going for as much

as \$5000 each. The family survival relied heavily on the huge gardens that Lizzie grew and all the preserving, canning, and the use of the root cellar, along with the butchering of their farm animals, like pigs, and beef, or chickens. They also sold cream and eggs.

They got their water from a well, and at first, they used oil lamps and lanterns for lighting their homes, but there was always the danger and fear of starting a fire if someone mistakenly dropped one or had an accident. While still on the farm at Neudorf, they eventually turned to a 32-volt battery system. They had an old generator run by a gas engine, and a windmill. Housed inside the house, they would start the generator to do the laundry and charge batteries at the same time. They had 16 batteries, about the height of a cream can, and with two put together, they would get the 32 volts they needed to run various appliances or pieces of equipment, plus the lights. Lizzie used a treadle sewing machine for sewing and mending and was incredibly excited when she eventually got an electric one. She always had to haul water from a well, until they eventually were able to put in a cistern, and have running water.

Judith Silverthorne recalls of her grandmother Lizzie Assmann when excited or telling a story with emphasis saying in German: "Mein Gott im Himmel" – a German interjection which means "my god in heaven" (another way of saying "oh, my goodness"). The family recalls Lizzie doing a great deal of needlework, mostly crocheting. She was always doing laundry, cooking, baking, cleaning, and milking, so she never got out too much otherwise nor was involved too much in the community activities. She did attend church every Sunday and there were tons of people coming for eggs and cream, timing it for coffee time or meals, as her talents shone in that area. People always showed up on Sunday afternoon and often stayed for supper. With their large family and the host of visitors a baseball game was a huge activity in the summertime.

Everyone remembers that Lizzie was always the last one to bed, mending late into the night and the first one up in the morning. Except in the winter when it was really cold, they said. Then Adolf got up first and stoked the fire as the water froze in the tea kettle on those days. At that time there was no insulation in the house, and the blanket's on the beds would freeze to the interior wall of the house.

Lizzie was always charitable. When the church had students coming from Concordia College and they needed to be billeted, Lizzie always had two people staying with them. She liked to go to town Saturday night as the stores were open then and they could do their weekly shopping. Once this was done, she'd go to visit her stepmother Barbara Hain³² for the evening while the men went for coffee somewhere. (See more about her life in at the end of this chapter in the eulogy.)

Adolf laughed a lot and had a wonderful sense of humour. The family members said although he was strict, he never raised his voice or spanked anyone. He just had to give them the "look" and they toned down and behaved. He loved farming. Even on a Sunday, he loved walking around

the farm to see if fencing was good, how the crops and livestock were doing. He loved picking berries in the summertime too. In later years, he was somewhat hard of hearing, but eventually got a hearing aid. He was heavily involved in the church as an elder, and in his senior years went to the local senior's centre almost daily to play cards. long as she was able she enjoyed gardening, baking, cooking, knitting, and doing everything to help her home run smoothly.





In March 1996 he celebrated his 90th birthday in several ways - with a big family supper, and another smaller supper with friends and neighbours in the local hotel dining room.

As he headed around the front of the truck to get into his house, the friend, who thought he was in reverse, moved forward and nudged Adolf, who then fell and broke his hip. Adolf succumbed to heart problems while in hospital for his hip. He died 21 May 1998 in the Regina General Hospital, Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada.

IMAGES OF MY GRANDMA

Eulogy of Elisabeth Assman by Judith Silverthorne, 16 July 1995

My grandmother was born, Marie Elizabeth Krahnenbil, at Grayson on December 10 in 1908 to Marie Elizabeth Lowenberg and Emil Krahnenbil. She soon became known as Elizabeth or Lizzie to those around her. As a young girl in 1916 she walked a mile and a half to Piller school, which she attended for most of her education, except for a few months when she went to Baber school.

When she was eleven years old in 1920, her mother passed away, and young Lizzie was left to care for the family, which included her father and seven-year-old brother, Albert. Her sister, Clara, a seven-month-old baby at the time, was cared for by an aunt and uncle some distance away. A year later, Lizzie was happy and relieved when her father married a loving woman, Barbara Senft, and she could turn over many of her former duties and become a child once again, especially with the addition of two more children, Esther and Ella, in due course.

She was baptized in the Christian faith in 1909 and confirmed in 1924. Several years later, in 1930, on the 13th of February, Elizabeth married a gentle, neighbouring farmer, Adolf Assman. Over the ensuing years, she gave birth to nine precious children: Elaine, Wilbert, Richard, Pearl, Raymond, Joan, Jean, Norma and Marlene.

For the first few years they farmed at Neudorf, living in the same yard as her husband's family, but in 1937 the young Assmans bought their own farm two miles away. Then in 1961 they moved to a farm in the Grenfell district, and later retired into the town in 1974. Her cherished offspring went on to give her 14 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren, all of which were close to her heart.

To her family, Elizabeth Assman, was much more than wife, mother, grandmother and great-grandmother. Her inner beauty and love shone forth from deep within her being, reflected in the warm twinkling of her eyes. For me, she was a solid foundation. She gave me the courage to be who I am today. She showed me that by sheer determination of strength of spirit you could overcome any problem. She did this just by being who she was, by the example of how she lived.

From as early as I can remember my grandparent's house, whether at Neudorf or Grenfell, seemed to bulge at the seams with people - laughing, talking, a joyous noisy profusion of happenings, with unexpected visitors driving into the yard, dogs barking, the radio turned to hymn sings or country music, and people sitting down at the kitchen table for several shifts of meals. At the heart of all the excitement stood my grandmother - a playful smile that lit up her face and made her eyes sparkle with warmth and merriment, taking everything in stride. Nothing seemed to ruffle her, she welcomed everyone.

I can still see her in her crowded kitchen, surrounded by caring, helpful daughters, praised by the menfolk and children alike for her delicious meals, and coffee breaks with fresh baked cinnamon rolls and kuchens never to be equalled anywhere. Sometimes I'd watch as she expertly cut strands of homemade noodles and delicately laid them across a cloth on a back of a chair, or punched down bread dough and later slipped the steaming loaves from the oven onto the counter. I can even still taste her wonderful cabbage rolls.

At times I'd marvel at her inner strength and patience, at her ability to accomplish so much in one day. She hustled about doing chores from early morning til late at night. I never knew when she went to bed or when she got up. She was always the first and the last to do so ... at least in my memories.

Even when she took time out to watch the soap operas on television some afternoons, her hands were never idle. In the summer she shelled peas or cleaned saskatoons or chokecherries while she tuned into the set. In the winter she crocheted, and in later years even made afghans for every member of her large family.

I can still picture Grandma working in her huge garden, waist high with a hoe in the tall pea patch, or half-hidden in the corn, or sitting on the porch step, shelling peas. She was so efficient whether milking cows, feeding chickens, gathering eggs or doing housework. She worked hard, simply because it had to be done.

Sometimes there'd be quiet times with my Grandmother - when all her chores were complete. She'd tell me of her past, the family life she'd led. A small woman with open arms and a big heart, she always took the time to talk to people, to make them feel special. She discussed things with me, always treating me with respect, as if I were an adult like her. She made me feel important, and hardly ever scolded me, even when I was five years old and kept sticking my fingers in the butter that rested on the dumbwaiter. She'd just laugh at my antics.

When I was older and on my own, I tried to visit my grandparents as often as I could. One weekend in particular while they still lived on the farm at Grenfell, I recall when I went for such a visit. I stayed as long as I could that weekend, even spending Sunday night and arising extra early on the Monday morning so I could drive straight back to my job in Regina. I remember how thrilled my grandma was that I took the time to see her and stay so long, but I did it because I wanted to, she made me feel special. How could I resist Grandma's warm loving smile and those twinkling eyes that reached right into the depths of her humanitarian soul? I loved her wonderful sense of humour and how good she made me feel.

Besides, she gave me guidance that I am only just now coming to realize was true wisdom. Whenever I'd go to her with some problem or ask her advice, she'd give me answers that were never direct, but ones I'd have to contemplate before I could understand. "Grandma," I'd say after carefully explaining a situation to her, "What do you think I should do?"

She'd look long into my eyes and tilt her head to one side. "Well, that's up to you, you have to make up your own mind," she'd gently say. "You have to do what you think. Do what's right for you."

In later years when her mind sometimes failed her, she still had a special smile for me, and I remember even a year ago she told me the same thing when I asked her opinion about a dilemma. "You do what you think," she said, and I remember laughing because she was just as knowing as she'd always been, and I told her so. Then she laughed, because she was a humble woman and never considered herself wise, but she was pleased that I thought her so.

I'll always remember my grandmother because she constantly gave from the heart, never expecting much in return, and, although, I always felt my grandmother and I had a special bond, I know she cared equally as much for each and everyone of her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. I also know that she has gone to a far better place where she can watch over us all, with a twinkle in her eyes and a smile in her heart, and that her gentle, loving spirit will live on in each of us, carrying us forward to each new day.

EULOGY OF ADOLF ASSMAN BY SON-IN-LAW STAN ILES

I'm Stan Iles husband of Adolf Assman's eldest daughter Elaine to give a tribute to our father-in-law.

The first time that I met Adolf Assman was on May 8, 1954 when Elaine asked me to come home with her to meet her parents [at Neudorf]. Going to be the first to ask for the hand of one of his 6 daughters in marriage, I was very apprehensive. My fears were unfounded for when I arrived, I met a very warm and friendly family that made me very welcome.

Adolf, whom I quickly took to calling Dad, was a kind and gentle man with a quick wit and friendly disposition. The first weekend spent at the Neudorf farm, Dad taught me the art of throwing horseshoes. There are so many pleasant memories of Dad but one that comes to mind was when Dad and Mum and 3 of the youngest children arrived in Glenavon on a stormy winter afternoon to visit us at our farm 6 miles from town.

A typical Saskatchewan winter storm soon made roads impassable, and we soon realized that travel back home to Neudorf was impossible and we were having a rapid increase in the size of our family 2 bedrooms and 7 people. As the storm blocked all roads for about a week, Mum started to fret about getting home. Dad on the other hand just laughed and said we have all the older children at home to look after the farm, so I am just going to have a holiday and help Stan with his chores. When Mum talked about other ways of getting home, Dad just laughed and said I'm not going home without my car if it takes until spring.

Dad enjoyed life to the fullest, but his main priorities were his church, his family and farming. In recent years after retiring to town [Grenfell] his priorities were still his church, his family, his friends and playing cards (he was a formidable opponent in a game of cards). Mum and Dad were blessed with 9 loving children who were always close to their parents, they visited together often. And celebrated Christmas, birthdays, anniversaries and many other good times together as a large happy family who enjoyed being together throughout the years.

The common thread that holds a family together is sometimes weakened when the parents have passed on, but this family will always be close and will continue to celebrate as one large and happy family whenever possible, and nothing would have made Mum and Dad happier.

God bless you, Dad; we will all miss you very much but our loss is heaven's gain.

SOMEONE WHO MADE A DIFFERENCE

Eulogy of Adolf Assman by granddaughter Judith Silverthorne

This memory is one I always put off writing about- I guess I expected, or at least secretly hoped, my grandfather would be around forever, even though I knew this couldn't be possible.

When I began recalling my grandfather and how he affected me, I thought of his life in terms of being a celebration.

The first thing that comes to mind was his wonderful sense of humour and the twinkle in his eyes. He was always the solid comforting person, who never spoke harshly to me. In my memory, he was a gentle man, who was often silently observing, quietly chatting away, and then there'd be an unexpected comment, or a joke and we'd be laughing around the kitchen table. He was always so spontaneous and fun.

Other early memories are those of my grandpa working hard outdoors in the fields or at the barn, where I only joined him occasionally. I remember him in the giant potato fields, hillng or hoeing, and doing it cheerfully, just because it had to be done, chiding me playfully, if I complained about it being too hot or so much work. It seemed like an ominous chore to me as a child. He'd finish that task, and then move on to something else, whether that was repairing a tractor, or feeding the animals, methodically completing one thing after another with a jaunting step, and that twinkle in his eyes.

Above all my grandfather was a hard-working farmer. Sometimes, I'd be one of the lucky ones to haul lunches out into the fields at harvest time and catch glimpses of him at work. Those were magical moments to me, being out in the field with my grandfather; his smiling face smudged a little with dirt as we sat under the slanting autumn sun with the smell of freshly combined grain and the hint of crispness in the air. I'd become part of his world, his world of working the land, and providing sustenance for others, another job he did joyfully.

I think one of the things he enjoyed most, was being out in the berry patch, picking saskatoons. I remember, whenever my aunts and I would go out to the bushes in the pasture with my grandfather, he'd disappear for a long time. Even though the rest of us would be laughing and talking, and eating the berries, we'd never hear a word from him. He'd appear silently, and yes he'd have a few berry stains around his mouth, too, but his pail would be fuller than everyone else's.

In the wintertime, I remember him most at mealtimes, keeping a lively conversation going around the table, or in the evenings, reading newspapers and magazines, or sitting quietly and watching a hockey game in the darkened living room. I also remember him surrounded by family, friends, and neighbours dropping in, and huge fun family gatherings at Christmas time, where the house would be bulging at the seams, and we'd have to squeeze as many as we could into beds and on makeshift ones on the floors so everyone had a place to sleep after the late night talks and the crowded noisy card games.

Perhaps one of the things I remember most was his sense of wonder and excitement. In his later years, after he retired from the farm, he had more time to spend with others. This is when I learned of his sense of adventure. I'd show up at his house, and decide to do a little family research, and he'd hop in the car, eager to go with me to tromp through cemeteries and point out landmarks and important sites. We'd spend wonderful summer afternoons, talking and laughing about all kinds of topics. One time, he even made a trip all the way up to my home in the north. I was thrilled he'd made the effort and taken the time.

Grandpa was an outgoing, social man, who loved gardening, and visiting with friends and family, attending ball games, and playing cards with his buddies.

People were important to him. He also seemed to have a wide range of knowledge about many topics, and if he didn't know about something, he'd find out. His attitude was always positive.

What I also know of being around my grandpa and watching him throughout the years was that he was a man of integrity, honesty, fairness, and generosity, often to a fault. He was also a deeply sensitive man, with a gentleness and tenderness that endeared him to his family. In many ways he was a quiet, shy man, who kept his feelings to himself. In particular, I know he was proud of his family, especially his children, although he may never have expressed it directly to anyone. For me, he always seemed to have a smile on his face, and an understanding and acceptance of whatever I said or did.

He always made me feel special, and he was dear to me, as I'm sure he was to all of us. I'm also sure we all have particular memories of him, and that we'll miss him for different reasons. My sadness at his passing extends in a different way. This means a close to a chapter of my life, the last link to that part of my childhood, my last grandparent to outlive the others.

But I can also find comfort and rejoice for having known him, for knowing that he had a full and engaging life, still living in his own home, still healthy and active, still interested in gardening, still meeting with friends and enjoying visits from family, still teasing and joking and laughing.

I think we can all say his memory will endure and that he was someone whose presence affected our lives. I, for one, will always remember the twinkle in my grandfather's eyes and be able to recall the memories of a wonderful man who made a difference in my life, and I am comforted in knowing his spirit lives on.

Elaine attended Baber School #456 at Neudorf. Elaine said she made it through grade seven, but then her sister Jean was born at the end of the school year, and she had to stay home and help, so couldn't complete her grade eight. She was good in math and spelling, and even was in regional spelling bees. She said she didn't like nature science classes as much.

She recalls going with her dad with a cart and pony to her grandmother's house to colour Easter eggs for the rest of the children. Another time she recalls, Richard driving the horse and cart to school and he hit the gate post, and they all went flying out. She recalls that we lived with Grandma Assman before I went to school. She also remembers getting a child's China tea

set from her grandmother, but when she was walking upstairs with it, it slipped and broke.

In her own words, Elaine said: *"The work at home was mostly housework, and barn chores, such as milking cows, feeding the chickens, gathering eggs, gardening, and preserving and other general daily tasks along with helping with the younger children and constant company that arrived on Sunday afternoons that had to be fed. I baked a lot of sponge cake.*

I had to help with everything, whatever there was to do. I learned to do everything, outside, inside. Lots of gardens, and chickens that we sent to the eggs to the hatchery. We canned beef stew, fish. The Goebels came and sold fish to us. We had an icehouse cellar in the house with a trap door. We would melt snow for water. We had eleven cows to milk, and we always had to go and get them they weren't just waiting for us. Cooking, cleaning, washing, ironing seemed constant. Mondays was laundry day. We had batteries. Our telephone ring was three long ones and one short one.

In the summertime we always made it out to Aunt Frieda's for a big ball game. No work, no farming on Sundays, just chores. I saved my money, and I bought a chest; it was \$20 when I bought it. That's the only thing I remember buying, and I still got it and I did lots of embroidery. Always working, embroidering or rocking the little ones to sleep."


At the age of 22, Elaine went to work in Regina for a time as a housekeeper, and then took a job at Glenavon as a housekeeper and to help with the children for Reta and Thomas Vipond on their farm. This is where she met one of the neighbouring relatives, who became her husband. She also worked for a time for Bella and Bud Kelsey, and a short stint at Fillmore.

She married Herbert Stanley (Stan) Thomas Iles on 19 November 1954 in Neudorf, Saskatchewan.

Elaine Assman and Stan Iles wedding portrait, 19 November 1954





Judith was born on 11 March 1953, and Darrell arrived 14 October 1955





In the early years, Elaine was fully occupied as a housewife and mom, and grew a large garden in the summer time from which she did lots of preserving, canning. She also did many tasks in the winter like sewing and mending, laundry, cooking, and cleaning. She sewed clothes for herself and both daughters, always wanting them to match, like the mauve checked dresses in the photo below.

As the children grew up, Elaine started doing a few hobbies. She became keenly interested in doing ceramics and took her first class in April of 1968, eventually coming to own her own kiln. She also poured greenware for other people, and made many gifts for family and friends. She took a typing class in the fall of 1982 and cake decorating class in January of 1983. Although she finished driver training in June of 1966 and got her driver's license, Elaine never felt too comfortable driving on her own, and encouraged Stan to do it most of the time.

In order to help make ends meet, Elaine took in boarders, sometimes 2, 3 and even 4 at a time, which made for some hilarious and precarious situations, until she learned it was best to have either all girls or all guys, with guys being the easiest, otherwise our one bathroom was occupied too long with the girls getting ready in the morning, holding up kids getting ready for school, and Stan off to work. Elaine also did daytime babysitting for the local neighbours until 1970.

By then the oldest children were in high school, so on 27 August 1970 Elaine began working for Sears Catalogue Shopping Centre, where she helped fill catalogue orders on a parttime basis. In 1990 she was celebrated for twenty years service, and she finally retired from Sears in 1993.

Elaine became involved in singing in the church choir in later years, which she enjoyed very much. They were members of the Redeemer Lutheran Church where the children attended Sunday School, and later were confirmed. When it closed, they moved over to the Mount Olive Lutheran Church.

Throughout their lives, Stan and Elaine loved dancing. For several decades they took up square dancing on a regular basis, attending regular Thursday night dances with the St. Cecilia Happy Hearts, and travelling to other places as well. They danced for other events, and occasions, simply for the joy of dancing! They also loved socializing and often appeared in matching outfits.



Stan was also keen to learn to fly an airplane. On 28 March 1971, Stan took his first training flight from the Regina Flying Club. He certified as a pilot on 2 October 1971. He furthered this achievement by obtaining his night endorsement on 21 March 1972. Stan & Elaine joined the Regina Flying Club and were elected to various officers of the committees. In 1972 they joined the Sherwood Forest Country Club, later becoming shareholders, of which Elaine remains to this day.

In May of 1979 they moved to another house on 639 Argyle St. By this time Darlene was the only one still living at home.

Although Stan had been working as an electrician a little on the farm, when they moved to Regina, he began his life-long work as an electrician. He worked first for other companies, like Stetner Electric, and then on May 19, 1982, he formed Iles Electric, an electrical company with his youngest son, Barry.



Over the years it expanded and grew. He remained there, until he retired in 1992.





Stan & Elaine travelled a great deal throughout their lives as well, with Stan even building campers to haul behind the car to take the family on economical holidays. First, he built a collapsible tent trailer and then a folding solid walled camper and he took the family mostly into the US to Disneyland one year, to visit cousins in Colorado, another to Florida one winter.

Here's a brief synopsis of their travels with the family:

Travelling became a favorite pastime each year. In 1963 Stan & Elaine & Joan, Elaine's sister, travelled to the Black Hills, South Dakota for a four-day long weekend, sleeping in the back of their station wagon, while the children stayed at Grandma and Grandpa Assman's farm. In 1964, Stan & Elaine went to B.C. & Oregon for two weeks, minus the children again. This time the children stayed with Grandma & Grandpa Iles's farm.

In 1965 the whole family travelled to Colorado and New Mexico. The following summer (1966) was spent in California and Mexico and surrounding areas with the family. In 1967 the whole





family traveled Montreal for Expo 67, the international exposition held to celebrate Canada's centennial. From the end of Dec 1968 to sometime in January 1969 the family travelled to Colorado for Christmas, then on to Texas, Mexico and Florida for a month. In the summer of 1969 a Saskatchewan tour was planned, complete with children and Iles grandparents. Although mostly an okay time, the boat was damaged in a highway accident when the car, camper, and boat trailer jackknifed. 1970 was spent in Banff, with the family except for Judith. 1972 brought an excursion to Alaska following the Alaskan Highway with everyone present, except Darrell who had a job, and Judith flew back early for work. In 1971 was an excursion to the East Coast, including Maine, P.E.I., and Washington, D.C. minus Judith again.

In 1975, Mary, Henry, Stan & Elaine toured England for the month of April. 1973 Elaine and Stan and the youngest

kids spent at Sherwood Forest Country Club, a camping site just outside of Regina, and 1974 was a trip to Waterton, Alberta with just Darlene along. In 1977 Stan, Elaine, Darlene, Mary & Henry went to Colorado in the summertime. In the winter Darlene, went with Stan & Elaine to Hawaii. Darlene also accompanied Stan & Elaine to the Black Hills, South Dakota again in 1976. In 1982 in February, Stan & Elaine toured Phoenix for two weeks.

In later years Stan and Elaine travelled on their own with their RV to many places in North America, especially after they both retired in 1993. Not too long after this, Stan and Elaine became "Snowbirds," and spent their winters in Arizona, purchasing a park model trailer they situated in Mesa. Although they still kept their RV to travel to various places, they sold the park model in Mesa sometime before 2010.

The following is Stan's story in his own words:

Although I don't remember, I was told that I came into this world on Christmas Eve 1931, what a surprise when all were expecting Santa!

My parents, Henry and Mary Iles (Vipond) say that it was nice weather with very little snow. Dr Cook traveled by car from Wolseley to attend my mother, Dad said he stayed in the barn petting the cats, as there was no place for him in the house (16x20 ft - 2 rooms and a pantry, small, but warm and cozy). They named me Herbert Stanley Thomas Iles after my two grandfathers (Herbert Iles and Thomas Vipond) and an army friend of my dad's, Stanley Bales, who had died in the First World War. Thus I came to be called Stan throughout my life. Growing up I did not realize that we were poor and in the middle of a depression as all families were the same, warm, safe and loved. We were never hungry. Mother always had a large garden and she carried water from the well to keep it growing. She also raised chickens, which supplied us with eggs.

Dad always had cattle and sometimes pigs so there was milk and meat, and all being well some to sell. Whenever Dad could be away from the farm, he would work with his team of horses helping to build roads in the district to earn extra money for other staples. Trees chopped down during the winter months in the local area and hauled home for sawing into firewood lengths provided wood for the stove for heat and cooking.

In summer, there were always piles of nice sandy dirt everywhere, along fences, in bushes and in the lea of buildings to play in. What I did not know at the time that it was all the good soil blown by the high winds from the fields that were scoured down to the hard pan along with any vegetation that had survived (Russian thistle and low weeds).

Other things that added to my parent's hardship during the 30s was when my mother was hospitalized for 58 days due to complications with a ruptured appendix and my father severed the thumb off his hand helping a neighbour saw firewood. He traveled to Regina by train with the severed thumb held on by some sinew, bandaged into his palm of his hand and the doctor reattached the thumb (a true marvel in those years).

In 1939, I started school at Huntingford #1412, a rural school 3 1/2 miles away from our home. From Easter to summer holidays in June was kindergarten and then into grade one in August. All went well until May of 1940 when I had a appendix attack and was hospitalized. After 10 days in hospital, I was sent home only to have a relapse and then spent another two weeks in bed. As there was no health insurance in those years, Dad was burdened by a large debt as each of us had been in hospital over a period of 8 years.

Also in 1939, war was declared and many things changed. There was a shortage of many of things that we took for granted. Each member of a family received a ration book and you could only buy the amount of food that you had coupons for. Some that I can remember were sugar, butter, syrup, meat, coffee, tea and then there was other food that I fail to remember. It was at

this time that my father took up beekeeping as the honey was used in place of sugar, syrup and any other sweeteners. Chocolate and candy of any kind were unavailable.

In the early 1940's weather and crops started to improve (Dad's best crop was in 1944), enabling him to purchase a used Ford tractor for fieldwork and help relieve the burden on the horses.

The war years are hard to describe, as with war, the economy improves with the cost of the lives of many of the young men and women from every community. It seemed worlds away from us and yet so very close. We could not imagine what it was like in Europe. We were kept up to date with the war by radio, if you had one (which we did not have), and by weekly newspapers.

It was at this time that the flying bug bit me, as young men from many countries were training in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta and were constantly flying over the farm (some at tree top height). Although it was many years latter (1971) that I took pilot training for my license, it was always a dream that I would be able to do it someday (no fool like a 40-year-old fool).

The 40's were good farming years and Dad bought a second $\frac{1}{4}$ section of land on the west side of the home quarter from Tom and Ernest Nelson. They were to retain the use of their yard and buildings until they moved. After a time they moved to Pender Island, BC, but soon returned, as they missed the country, farm life and their friends. They then built a new two-room house in their yard, as the old shack they had lived in for many years was getting past repair. Soon after the house was built, and before they moved in, Ernest took their shotgun to hunt for Prairie Chicken. When he was climbing through a fence, the gun discharged, and he was killed. Tom no longer wanted to stay alone on the farm and moved to Regina until his passing.

Dad then moved their new house over to the home quarter and attached it to our existing house. He hand dug the cellar before moving it in place. This made a much larger home with two bedrooms, kitchen, living room and pantry. He then insulated the new part and finished the inside. Over the years a veranda was added, the cellar was dug out and cement walls and floor put in (this was all done by hand with pick and shovel).

By this time, I had completed my schooling with grade 8 and helped Dad operate the farm. More bush was cleared and land broken. We were in the early 50's and I wanted to make extra money so took on the job of telephone repairman for the "Baring Rural Telephone Co," maintaining three rural lines. As I was only 15, I could not apply for a driver's license so had to travel by horse or have Dad drive me to make repairs and installations.

Also during this time, I became interested in music as Dad played the violin and my Aunt Bella the organ and accordion. I purchased a used piano accordion, practiced and was soon playing by ear. I later ordered a guitar from Eaton catalogue and learned to play it. It was in this period that we got together with Rueben Tennant and started to play at local dances. As time went on, we added new members (Stan, Joe & Edwin Cwynar) to the band and were known as "The Deveron Country Cousins."

In the late 40's a curling rink was built in Baring and soon we all joined the "Baring Curling Club." Mum, Dad and I traveled by team and sleigh to Baring after an early lunch and returned at suppertime, so the winter months then became much busier. Also at this time, Uncle George Vipond purchased a "Bombardier," an 18-passenger snowmobile and many times, we drove the horses the mile to Grandma's farm and traveled with him and my Aunt Jean, as they were very involved with curling.

Also in the same years, I wanted to change our way of life and have electricity on the farm. With money that I saved, we purchased a 32-volt lighting plant and batteries from a farmer in Manitoba and shipped them in by train. This started a whole new career, as I worked and

watched Uncle George with the power plant at his farm and under his tutoring was soon on the way into the electrical field. A year or so later I purchased a large "Jacobs" wind charger and after a few tries (because of the height) Dad and I built the tower. It was built one piece at a time and bolted together to a height of 60 feet, and the generator installed on top (the generator alone weighed 1200 pounds). That being done, others became interested and Tommy & Reta Vipond and Vern & Susie Sharpe bought the same type of wind chargers for their farms and Dad and I built their towers and installed there equipment. Now being involved with this work required an "Electrical Contractors License," so it was off to Regina by train to write for a license, which I obtained.

At about this time the farm electrification was being promoted by the government of the day and power lines were being strung in all of the local districts. With this, there was call for Electrical Contractors, (right place, right time) and I was in business. With the help of Dad and Uncle George, we wired many farms throughout the local districts. Whenever it rained or farm work was caught up, the tools and supplies were put in Uncle George's truck or Dad's car and off we went as electrical contractors.

In the spring of 1954, another change took place. A beautiful young girl came to work in the district for Tom & Reta Vipond by the name of Elaine Assman, and after a whirlwind courtship, we were married on November 19, 1954. This of course entailed other problems, but with the help of Dad, we were able to rent land of our own. We rented a $\frac{1}{4}$ section of land with house & barn from Tom Vipond (the Urcyl Dyer farm across the road from the final location of Elkwood School).


That winter I was asked if I could look after lighting the fire and emptying the ashes for the school. I carried over a supply of coal and wood for the day, so that it would be warm when the teacher and pupils arrived (about an hour's work and I was paid 10 cents per day). We also had another $\frac{1}{2}$ section rented, and with the equipment that I acquired during that summer, Dad and I worked together. The farms were only 3 miles apart as the crow flies. Each of our parents gave us a cow and with other cattle that we bought, we were soon doing well with the farm. I was able to supplement the farm income doing electrical contracting. I also served on the Elkwood School Board as secretary treasurer.

Tom Vipond had just bought a Caterpillar tractor for some of his land work and he asked me if I was interested in operating the "Cat" when I was not busy on our own farm. This was another opportunity for more income, so I grabbed it. When we were finished fieldwork with the "Cat," we worked for the town of Glenavon moving earth with the scraper or bulldozer. During this time, the only time I was home was late at night or on Sundays. One thing led to another and soon we were doing work all over the district, bulldozing large pits to bury stone piles, and clearing bush off land for breaking. Many times when it was busy, I ran the "Cat" 12 – 14 hours a day clearing bush. We worked well into the winter months, as I had more time as there was no field work. There was no time to play at dances, so I also dropped out of the band (so the band lost a cousin) Most of the electrical contracting was done in winter when we were not clearing bush. Usually the roads were blocked with snow, so the supplies and tools were loaded into the sleigh and I traveled to jobs with horses.

By mid 1958, we had three children, Judith, Darrell & Barry, and Elaine was doing most of the milking and farm chores. A lot of our income was from the electrical contracting and we decided that we would be better off if we left the farm and did electrical work only. I was also having a hard time with grain dust due to allergies, so the decision was made. Much as we both loved farm life, it was time to move on. In the spring of 1959, I secured work in Regina and Elaine looked after the farm until we could sell our livestock and equipment, and we were able to buy a house and move the family to the city. We still reside in Regina 50 years later. (Written in 2009).

Funeral Bulleting Contents:

Herbert Stanley Thomas Iles was born to Henry and Mary Iles on 24 December 1931 at his parent's home near Baring, SK on Sec. 14, Tp. 15, Range 9, west of the 2nd Meridian. Named after his two grandfathers and a friend of his father's who'd died in the First World War, he was known as Stan. He attended Huntingford School, District A412, beginning at Easter of 1939. He finished the 8th grade in 1947.

When old enough he began playing in the family orchestra called the "Devron Country Cousins." They played for local dances and weddings, often playing every weekend or anytime they were requested. They continued until 1955.

Stan helped farm the home farm and also worked for the Baring Rural Telephone Company as a telephone lineman, beginning at the age of 15. After his marriage to Elaine Assman from Neudorf on November 19, 1954, they rented the Urcyl Dyer Farm and the Kelsey Farm, which was then owned by Tom Vipond. He continued to work as a telephone lineman as well as working on the rented farm. Two years were spent running a caterpillar for Tom Vipond.

Stan had also obtained his Electrician License on May 3rd, 1952 and did electrical contracting until they left the Elkwood District. In 1953 he quit working for the Telephone Company, but he did take on the job of the secretary of the Elkwood School Board, which incidentally was just across the road from the farm where he lived. By this time the family consisted of Judith, Darrell and Barry. Stan began working for Tegart Electric in Regina in May of 1959. Later that month, the family moved into Regina, where they remained. Their youngest daughter, Darlene, was born in the fall of 1959.

At a young age Stan developed an interest in photography, which he kept up all his life. In 1967, he and Elaine began square dancing with the St. Cecilia Happy Hearts and continued for 30 years. On 2nd October 1971 Stan became a pilot through the Regina Flying Club. In 1972 Stan and Elaine joined the Sherwood Forest Country Club. In 1963 he began working for Stetner Electric where he remained for 19 years. On May of 1982 Stan and his youngest son Barry officially began Iles Electric Ltd. Stan retired in 1990, though he occasionally helped out in the shop over the next 3 or so years after retirement.

Stan and Elaine became involved in 1991 with the Queen City Sams -a branch of the international Good Sams RV Club, and ten years ago started the Prairie Lily Chapter of the Newmar Kountry Club, another RV social club. Not only were Stan and Elaine involved in all of these Clubs, they also served on the Board of Directors, were President couple and did many tasks, such as organizing events, tours, activities, keeping archives, and writing newsletters. Stan and Elaine also volunteered to work at the Nordic HostFest in Minot for the past six years. In 1982 Stan and Elaine began wintering in Mesa, Arizona, which they enjoyed for 25 years.

Stan was predeceased by his parents Henry and Mary Iles. 



JUDITH ARLENE ILES


Judith Arlene Iles, born 11 March 1953, Regina, Saskatchewan; married 29 August 1980, Regina, Saskatchewan to **Alan Lawrence Silverthorne** (1950-).

"I grew up for the first six years of my life on the farm at Glenavon with my parents and eventual siblings and surrounded by many pets. I loved exploring and being in nature on the prairies, which I continue to find exhilarating and nurturing to this day.¹

I began my education at a one-room schoolhouse, which happened to be right across the road from the farm the family was renting from land owned by Thomas Vipond. I attended Elkwood School for several months before the family moved to Regina."



In Regina, Judith finished kindergarten in May and June of 1959 at Wascana Elementary School about 7 blocks away from where they lived on 710 King Street. She attended Wascana Public School until June of 1967, completing her Grade 8 there. She then attended Scott Collegiate, graduating from Grade 12 in 1971. She indicated in her high school yearbook that she wanted to be a journalist, and she was one for a while, along with other related fields, expanding her repertoire.

When she was in Grade 4, she had her tonsils out at the Grey Nuns Hospital (now called the Pasqua Hospital). She took piano lessons for several years, and throughout her life she enjoyed telling stories, taking photographs, and travelling, which eventually translated into the type of jobs she secured through the years.

As a teenager she had various parttime jobs in high school: Empringham's Catering, Tommy Tinker Ice Cream Parlor, Dewdney Drugs, and the 5th Ave Drug Store. After graduating she obtained full-time employment in December 1971 with the Regina Public Library on the bookmobiles that moved around the city to serve patrons. During this time she was also a member of the Saskatchewan Poetry Society and several of her poems were published in anthologies.

In August 1973, she moved to Calgary for a short time to work for the Glenbow-Alberta Institute Library. She returned to Regina from October 1973 until end of January 1974, where she was employed at the Provincial Library as a typist in a temporary position. Then she moved to Peterborough Ontario and worked at Woolworths for a few weeks, waiting for a friend to finish her classes at the local college, then they toured the East coast for several weeks.

After she returned to Regina she started work with King Size Photo in May 1974, before switching to work with the University of Regina library services as a clerk typist. In May of 1975 she took holidays to Vancouver and Victoria, where she met her future husband for the first time, Alan Silverthorne. He moved to Regina in August 1975, where they met again and began seeing each other, eventually living together for five years until they decided to get married.

In the summer of 1977, Judith was the Confidential Secretary for the director of Radio for the CBC in Saskatchewan. Judith and Al also had some joint ventures like working for Greta's Restaurant as cooks from March 1978 for 5 weeks until it closed its doors. In April Judith took a job as cook at the Regina Golf Corse until the end of June. Then she got work with the newly opened Bartleby's restaurant where she was a cook and eventual dining room manager. Alan continued in the carpentry and woodworking line of work.

Judith also partnered with a colleague during this time to start a black and white photo business, but eventually started her own Custom Developing and Enlarging. This didn't last long, and she eventually found regular work again, and they bought a house at 510 St. John Street. Christmas 1977 and 1978 they spent in Winnipeg with Al's mother and aunt and uncle and again at Easter in April 1978.

Judith and Alan married on 30 August 1980 in Regina.

The marriage of Judith Arlene Iles, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Iles, to Alan Lawrence Silverthorne, son of Mrs. Ada Silverthorne, took place on Saturday, August 30, 1980 at the home of the bride's parents. Reverend Ramsey officiated at the ceremony.

The bride wore a $\frac{3}{4}$ length white knit dress with long sleeves. The neckline and cuffs were trimmed with sculptured lace. Royal blue bachelor buttons with white baby's breath were entwined throughout her hair. She carried a full bouquet of royal blue bachelor buttons, carnations and white baby's breath with trailing lace.

Maid of honor was Darlene Iles, sister of the bride. The bestman was Bill Schmidt, friend of the groom.

The bride's mother chose a $\frac{3}{4}$ length burgundy dress with designs. The groom's mother wore a deep pink $\frac{3}{4}$ length dress with a black sash at her waist.

A reception was held at Empringham's in the Brougham Room where Darrell Iles, brother of the bride, was Master of Ceremonies. A house party followed the reception attended by close relatives.

Mr. and Mrs. Silverthorne will reside in Regina.

Alan was born on 25 May 1950, Flin Flon, Manitoba to Leila Ada Mundel (11 January 1911-11 April 1981) and Harold Silverthorne (20 April 1907- 2 December 1980). He had grown up at Oxbow, Saskatchewan, where his mother was a hairdresser after she separated from Alan's father. Alan was working at a variety of carpentry jobs for construction and woodworking companies, and also worked from the provincial Government doing construction and maintenance from June 1979 until the fall of 1981.

Six weeks prior to their marriage, Judith started working with the Saskatchewan Government in the Photo Services department on 17 July 1980. During this time Al's mother became quite ill with cancer, and they moved her from her home in Winnipeg and brought her to live with them in Regina after their wedding. They care for her until she died 11 April 1981 in the Pasqua Hospital, having spent her last week there.

Judith and Alan lived in Regina for a few years, before purchasing a quarter section of land they bought at Endeavour, Saskatchewan, in about 1977. Here they built their own house and woodworking workshop from the ground up. They had a neighbour clear a section of trees off the land and dug out roots themselves.


Al and Judith built the workshops first, then the house themselves. They did the building during holiday times in the spring, summer or fall until the shop was built, then they moved up to the property in May 1983 and finished building the house with occasional help from friends or neighbours for heavier structural pieces like the rafters, and with help from Judith's electrical dad and brothers to accomplish the wiring.

For the first few years they did not have running water, hauling water from a well for drinking or a dugout to do laundry or melting snow in the winter. They also heated with wood, acquiring a woodburning stove from Norway. They first cooked on a wood stove as well, but later had electrical appliances when the power was installed to their property.



Al continued to do carpentry work in the area, and Judith eventually began writing for the local newspapers and the western Canadian newspaper called the Western Producer and their magazine insert called Western People. For several years she wrote feature articles for Endeavour and surrounding area for the Preeceville Progress, a weekly newspaper. Judith also began writing for other newspapers and magazines, as well as taking photographs to go with them, and started a recipe column.

Their son Aaron was born on 28 August 1984 at the Preeceville Union Hospital in Preeceville, Saskatchewan.



While pursuing articles on local people for the various newspapers she wrote for, Judith stumbled across a man by the name of Peter Rupchan, an early immigrant potter who homesteaded on land just outside of the neighbouring village of Usherville. She began researching and writing a book about him with the help of some of the local people who had known him and family members who could give her information and provide photographs.

In the winter of 1989, Judith, Al and Aaron were featured on a CBC TV show called *Countryside*, about how they were “back-to-the-landers”, going back to the way pioneers lived at one time, clearing their land, no running water, and basically building their place from scratch. After this show aired, they thought more about their lives.

In 1990, as Aaron had just started kindergarten, they decided they wanted a better education



for their son than was being offered at the time at Endeavour, so they moved to Regina to a house at 2816 – 24th Avenue. This three-bedroom bungalow became a great place to live, and that fall Aaron started grade 1 at Argyle School about two blocks away.

In 1991, Judith's book on Peter Rupchan was published by Prairie Lily Co-operative Ltd., called *Made in Saskatchewan: Peter Rupchan, Ukrainian Pioneer and Potter*. She launched it in the fall at a branch of the Regina Public Library along with an exhibition of Rupchan's pottery.

During this time, Judith kept in contact with the producers of the *Countryside* show, they had started another one called *One in a Million*. They asked Judith to be a researcher on the show, which she did for several episodes until the show was no longer produced.

Shortly thereafter, the producer of the show partnered with Judith to turn her book on Rupchan into a docudrama which they produced into a half hour show for CBC called *Rupchan: Spirit of a Prairie Potter*. She did a bit of research and writing work for a few other shows and editing of books for a self-publishing company during this time. Eventually she decided to go to university and began taking classes in English and film at the University of Regina. She dabbled in Reiki classes, and wrote her first fiction book, *The Secret of Sentinel Rock*, which was a children's middle grade time shift novel published by Coteau Books in 1996.

Around this time, Judith and Al decided to split and their divorce was finalized at the end of 1996.

Although Judith sometimes took in students from other countries who came to Canada to learn English, she found living at this location financially difficult to maintain and eventually sold the house on 24th Ave, moving to 2 ½ story house on 2310 Retallack Street with Aaron. During this time, she and a friend, Melonie Old, took Aaron to Guatemala for a two-week holiday from 31 December 1996-14 January 1997.

Judith also started her own production company, Spiral Film Productions Inc, and began producing television documentaries. She did several documentaries but found this difficult on her own and had to make the decision whether to get bigger and partner with another company or to quit. This was also around the time that the provincial government stopped the film tax credit that helped producers get productions started, and she knew she had to be able to raise her son,

so she took a regular job again. She became the Executive Director of the Saskatchewan Library Association, where she stayed for over seven years.

She eventually moved in with someone, buying a different house, but this didn't last, and she moved again with Aaron to another house on 2033 Retallack Street (later sold) and has been on her own ever since living in an apartment.

In 2001 she started teaching sessional classes on Freelance Business Skills in Film & Video and Stress Management in Film & Video at SIAST (Saskatchewan Institute of Applied Science and Technology, now called Saskatchewan Polytechnic). She taught these classes once or twice a year for ten years as well as teaching scriptwriting classes, for the University of Regina, Extension Department. All the while she kept writing novels for children, completing several series, the Secret series, the Dinosaur Series, and a ghost series.

In 2007, Judith, Aaron, and her parents went to Scotland for a holiday. Judith and Aaron continued on to England for an additional week. Judith took training to teach English as a second language for foreign students and got her Advanced TESOL Certificate. She decided to do some traveling around the world and look at possibilities for teaching English in foreign countries. She sold her house and Aaron moved into an apartment.

Judith did extensive travel in Europe: Cypress, Spain, Italy. And then after she received her TESOL certificate in Teaching Adults English from the Global TESOL College, she eventually went to China to teach English in 2008, but this didn't work out very well, so she travelled instead to explore Tibet. Unfortunately this was at the time China was invading Tibet and taking control, so she had to escape in the dead of night, returning surreptitiously to Canada. When she returned, she rented the apartment, where she remains to the current time.

By 2008-2009 she was teaching English online to Japanese students. She then began teaching writing classes at the University of Regina, centre for Continuing education for several years. In 2010, she became the Executive Director of the Saskatchewan Writers' Guild (SWG), where she remained until 2017. During this time she toured England for a month (in 2014) doing research for an adult historical novel (yet to be completed). In 2015, she published an all-ages picture book *Honouring the Buffalo: A Plains Cree Legend* in collaboration with Ray Lavallee of the Piapot First Nation, and illustrator Mike Keepness of the Pasqua First Nation. Originally published in English and Cree, the book was published in French/Cree in 2016. She also published a YA novel in 2016, *Convictions*. She retired from the SWG regular employment and became self-employed in 2017, and then in 2019 *Honouring the Buffalo* was published by a German publisher in German/Cree and she launched it at the Frankfurt Book Fair, followed by 2 or three tours throughout Germany and Europe over the next couple of years. In 2018-2019 she was the Writer-in-Residence at the Regina Public library for their 9-month term.


In 2016 she had established another film production company with her son, Silverlight Productions Inc. in 2016. (<https://silverlightproductionsinc.com/>). They produced a documentary in 2019 about Kay Parley (a former patient of the Weyburn Mental Institute and person who tried LSD in the 1950s at the hospital, who went on to become a psychiatric nurse and later an instructor).

Judith produced other documentaries throughout the next few years, and another with her son in 2023 for AMI broadcasters on stuttering called *Echoed Words*. One show she produced was an animated adaptation for preschoolers based on *Honouring the Buffalo* and another was a co-production with a colleague about a young man with muscular dystrophy who inspired his mother to start a Foundation to assist people to form volunteer teams to help people with disabilities.

Also during this time, Judith became heavily involved in researching her grandfather Adolf Assman's family history with her cousin Shelley Kloczko and they travelled to Ukraine and Germany in search of their roots in 2017 and 2018, which led to this family history publication.

In 2021 Judith filmed a documentary on a quadriplegic who has started alternative rehabilitation gyms for people with severe physical disabilities, and throughout 2022 to 2024, Judith travelled with a cinematographer and filmed a project about bison and buffalo all over the world, both of these have yet to be finished and broadcast. Judith's final middle grade novel was published in 2023.

Judith continues to produce documentaries for television, and she consults, critiques, evaluates, and edits books and screenplay for writers, as well writing freelance articles. She also continues to write books, albeit now in adult fiction and non-fiction, expanding on her nature photography pursuits. <https://judithsilverthorne.ca/>







Michelle's stories/memories:

- Always going on picnics and going to a farmer's field to eat lunch, fly kites and use the pellet guns to shoot old pop cans and the odd gopher
- Camping and going on the boat all of the time
- Watching storms while sitting in the garage with the big garage door open
- My dad having a lit smoke hanging out of his mouth when we were working on things with him
- Dad always making sure everyone else was ok and if we were, then he was!
- Barn dances and swimming at Sherwood Forest
- Tobogganing all of the time at Sherwood Forest
- Bingo nights in basement of St. Cecilia's Church with my Granny (Grandma Kaytor's mom)
- Mom and Dad would play the game where they are the kids, and we were the parents
- Scott & Michelle recalled another memory of when Darrell & Diane - they had multiple clocks around the house, so you would always here ticking and every hour they would all go over AT DIFFERENT TIMES so you literally had to pause a movie to let them do it's thing. When Scott would sleep over before we were married a lot of times he was on the couch and they had to stop the clocks for him so that he could sleep.

Christine's stories / memories:

- Going fishing with Mom & Dad, everything was going great, Michelle and I casting and reeling and casting and reeling – not catching anything. Mom and Dad were enjoying the day as we were trolling. Then Michelle and I lost our worms on our hooks and there was no way we were touching them. Dad steered to a spot where we could float a bit and bait our hooks, telling us the best way to catch a fish was to give the minnow a "good lick" before hooking it. Chuckling as we were gagging, he looked towards the boat motor and low and behold we were moving into the weeds Attempting to get away from the

weeds, he started the motor only to find out that it was also tangled in weeds. Michelle and I thought it was pretty funny as Mom and Dad were trying to get the motor free. It reminded us of a popular TV show at the time called Married with Children and we started singing the theme song "Love and Marriage" I can still remember Dad saying, "Oh real funny guys."

- I have another one about us when we all went ice fishing. We got thrown from the toboggan while Dad was whipping us around on the snowmobile leaving Mom watching all of the holes (which was technically illegal, too many holes drilled). She was panicking as she watched these two little bodies fly through the air!!
- Michelle couldn't say Endeavor and when Mom, Dad, Michelle and I went to visit our Auntie Judith and Uncle Al at Endeavour, she would ask how to say it and we would tell her and then she would just say "whatever" so now every time I think to say whatever, it comes out as "endeavor"
- I remember having friends that would come over and hang out and when they saw Mom and Dad cuddle together in an armchair, they couldn't figure out how it was possible to both fit of them and they were in awe seeing how much they loved each other. It always made me smile and filled my heart with pride on how close we all were!
- When we lived in Eston, while Mom and Dad were building the house, my sister and I were entrepreneurs at a very young age, we planted sunflowers in the garden and then we decided to put the seeds in little bags to sell to the neighbours, which left none for Mom and Dad. We even did a bottle drive for Brownies – but there wasn't even a bottle driver, needless to say Mom and Dad made us go around and give the bottles back. When we lived in Regina, we got gravel delivered for our driveway at Church Drive where we grew up and we found the biggest & best rocks to draw faces on and put up posters for a Pet Rock Sale. We had a very large cat growing up named Ringo. When we were having a basement sale we put Ringo in a bedroom and put a curtain up and had a sign that said largest cat in the world and people could go into the room to see him for \$1 (or something like that).





Christine Marie Iles




Christine was born on 18 March 1977 in Regina, Saskatchewan.



As a kid, Barry was heavily involved in playing baseball, and whenever the family went camping or out to the lake on a weekend, he was fishing and catching lots of fish too!



Barry in his own words:

"I spent the first couple of years on the farm although I don't remember them, I think farming was always in my blood.

I attended Wascana School for my first 8 years of school and then moved on to Scott Collegiate. At 11 years old, I was helping my brother Darrell with his paper route and soon got my own when I was 12. At 14, I worked at a restaurant doing dishes and cleaning tables.

By this time in my life I knew I would be working for myself no matter what it was going to be. At 15 ½, I started working at the Regina Flying Club as a ramp rat. It was a pretty cool job considering I had to move planes around to fuel up and get ready for customers. We also started a few of them by flipping the propeller. I had 1 close friend die in a plane crash and witnessed another trying to pull up a glider. Not long after this I moved on to a different job at a gas station.

In grade 11 (1975) I bought a new van and spent many weekends customizing into a small RV.

In 1977 I bought a new van to customize and sold the 1975 one. I spent many weekends travelling to Van Runs camping in farm fields with many other vanners. I spent most of my high school years with my then girl friend. I spent my first summer after school was finished putting up steel quonsets on farms in southern Saskatchewan.

After I finished school I took a job selling vacuums, awaiting a chance to get a job as an apprentice electrician at Stetner Electric where Dad worked. I did 5 ½ years working for them until Dad and I started Iles Electric. Iles Electric was started in 1982 when the electrical union decided to go on strike, so we became very busy in a very short time.

In this time, I got married to my 1st wife and lived in the house I bought earlier in 1979. We lived there until 1981 when we bought a new house on Maier Bay. In family life we had two beautiful girls, Amanda Sara Grace in 1983 and Amie Trina Ann in 1985.

Life was busy between running the office side and working in the field at Iles Electric, and I needed a get away from all work. So in 1987 we were able to purchase a lake front cabin at Pelican Pointe on Long Lake. We had already bought a boat in 1985 and spent many weekends putting it in and out of the lake. So buying a lake front cabin was a blessing, so I thought.

Now I spent a lot of the weekends working on an old property to get a water and septic system into the cabin so we could have a tub and shower available along with a new boat house and new concrete retaining wall and new concrete stairs going down to the water were just some of the weekend tasks that started to consume my time away from my family.

In 1997/1998 I was looking at building onto the new house but couldn't justify the additional costs for that area so we started to look at new property to build a new house of our liking and found a property in White City to build on. The drawings were done up in the winter of 1998 and the new build was started in early 1999. By late 1999 our relationship had become so distant that we eventually split and divorced.

I remarried in June of 2002.

In 2008 we bought acreage property in Preeceville on the Assiniboine river where we figured that some day we may retire out there. As life goes on building a retirement home is not in the cards and decided to just take out a travel trailer for a place to stay. A year later we purchased an additional 7 acres on the other side of the river which also had power available. The property has been transformed into a park like area used for enjoying wildlife and great summertime weather. The area also allows me several accessible lakes to enjoy fishing all within an hour or two.

In 2009 I also started to take off every Friday and have a 4 day work week. In 2009 we also started another business venture called Iron Mountain Excavating which also purchased 5 lots behind Iles Electric for the storage of equipment and trailers.

In September of 2010 I lost my former business partner and dad, which was totally unexpected.





Brent Whitney Assman was born 8 August 1967 at Wolseley, Saskatchewan, Canada, to Wilbert Assman and Doreen Baker. His middle name was originally going to be Wesley, but his mom changed it to Whitney just before she registered him.

Brent was the youngest of two sons, and attended schools in Grenfell, and followed in his older brother's footsteps playing baseball and hockey, and reffing hockey. He was very active in school sports, choir and drama, participating in two musicals ("The Mikado" & "Oklahoma"). (After he graduated, he was asked to come by the lead in "Oklahoma".) He played golf, Slo Pitch, Hockey, and reffed Minor Hockey, as well as in the SJHL (Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League).

In 1985 he graduated from Grade 12 and went to work full time at the Grenfell Coop. He was promoted to Hardware manger and received the Hardware Manager of the year in 1988. He moved to Kindersley in 1989 as Hardware Manager.

He moved to Meadow Lake in 1993 to work construction and in the spring of 1994 was hired by Beaver Lumber. In 1999, he and his brother bought the franchise, which eventually became Ace Lumber & Building Supplies. They opened their brand-new store in 2001.

In 2021, Brent made the decision to leave Ace Lumber. By 2023, he realized he missed the retail industry and found his lifelong dream job, managing a golf course. He has properties at Greig Lake and Huatulco, Mexico, but his favourite locations is his home by the golf course.

Richard Arthur Assmann was born on Valentine's Day, 14 February 1934 at Neudorf, Saskatchewan, to Adolf Assman (1906-1998) and Maria Elisabeth Krahobil (1908-1995). He died 15 August 2016 at the Regina General Hospital in Regina, Saskatchewan.²

He was raised at Neudorf. As a small youngster, he lived with his family at his grandmother Katharina Assman's house, until the family moved into their own house and farm. He was confirmed on 23 May 1948 in the Trinity Lutheran Church in Neudorf.

One day when he was about age 4 or 5, Richard was with his family visiting relatives on a farm near the neighbouring town of Lemberg, some fourteen miles or so away from his home at Neudorf. He decided he wanted to go see his Aunt Clara, who lived back near Neudorf on the farm across the road from his home, so off he set on his own. He was found two hours later, still trying to find his way.

When Richard turned 21, he struck out on his own again. This time he moved to Regina, getting into the construction trade where he worked on basements. About six months later, he began pumping gas at the Co-op Service Station on Robinson and Dewdney Ave. He switched to the BA Gas station on Garnet Street & Dewdney Ave in about 1958. Over the years, Richard gained experience and diligently worked his way up from gas attendant and operating the till, doing mechanical and repair work to the financial and administrative paperwork and learning all he could about the business until he worked and became a manager. He continued to work at service stations in Regina his entire adult life.

With taking on a more significant role in operations, when the BA company was taken over by Gulf Canada in 1969, he became the proud co-proprietor of the Gulf Garnet Service, and then sole owner. Years passed until 1985, when once again the parent company sold the service station, this time to Petro-Canada. At some point soon afterwards, the new company raised the rent at his location. Richard quit and went into retirement.

This didn't last, of course. He loved meeting and chatting with people. He truly enjoyed working as a gas attendant and was soon employed at the Northgate Petro Can. In 1995, he and a co-worker re-located to the Victoria Square Petro-Can, announcing their move in the Leader-Post. This announcement in the newspaper caught the attention of researchers on the David Letterman show. This promptly propelled him to celebrity status when he was made a household name across North America for four months in 1995, which became known as "Assmania". As a gas-station operator, with an unusual nickname name (Dick Assman), he attracted his "15 minutes of fame". David Letterman invited him onto his show in August of that year, which was televised from the Ed Sullivan Theater in New York city. When Richard walked on stage, he was presented with a bouquet of roses by Letterman.⁷ He was still working, only this time at a Petro-Canada.







For several decades he owned and raced horses with some degree of success in Regina, Saskatoon, and Winnipeg, aided by his jockeys and trainers.



Sask.'s Dick Assman, who gained fame on late-night TV, dies at 82

A Saskatchewan man who gained fame on late-night TV in the mid-1990s for his unusual and rather humorous name has died at 82.

Richard Arthur Assman, a.k.a. Dick Assman, was a gas station manager whose name caught the attention of TV host David Letterman in 1995, after it appeared in a local job notice.

Letterman ran with the joke on-air, and sure enough, it became a regular bit and fan-favourite on the "Late Show with David Letterman."

Assman eventually travelled to New York to make a well-received appearance on the show.

"When I went on the stage, that was something else," Assman told The Associated Press last year, as Letterman prepared to retire as host. "You walk on there, everybody is hollering."

"It was great, everything was first class, I enjoyed it."

Assman noted, with good humour, that the correct pronunciation of his name was actually OSS-man. But he played along with the joke, nonetheless.

Assman's older brother Ray told AP last year that, in the wake of "Assmania," his brother became known internationally. He recalled that on a trip to Las Vegas, a border security guard looked at his passport and asked him if he knew the Letterman guest.

Despite his brush with celebrity, Assman continued to work as a manager, mechanic and gas station attendant in Regina.

"If he won the lottery, he wouldn't change his lifestyle," Ray said in the 2015 interview. "All he has ever done is work all his life."

According to his memorial notice on the Speers Funeral Chapel website, Assman died peacefully in Regina on Aug. 15.

He leaves behind his brother, nephew, in-laws and other family and friends.

She was predeceased by her parents Henrietta and Earl; her husband Bryan; and long-time friend Dick.







Vern and Kevin purchased a semi and trailer and trucked for Triangle Movers for many years.


I was back at the Wolseley Nursing Home and worked there until I retired in 2006. I still have a large garden and many flowers in the summertime, with pansies being my favourite flower.



Kevin is the second of three children of Vern Sens and Joan Sens (née Assman) born 24 November 1966, in Regina, Saskatchewan.






She attended Baber School near Neudorf until the family moved to Grenfell in 1961. She completed her education in Grenfell.



He spent his early childhood in Indian Head, a farming town of 1,500, before the family, including younger brother, Curtis, moved into Regina. On 16 November 2006 Jason married **Hala Iskharya**.

He adored the Roughriders almost as much as reeling in a big walleye. For eight years, he had season tickets at Taylor Field, right beside his Uncle Don. After high school, Jason took a job

in the production plant of the local newspaper, the Regina Leader-Post. It was there he met Hala Iskharya, whose family had fled Saddam Hussein's Iraq and settled in the Prairies.

Jason took a job at Jay's Freight, a moving and storage company. He bought a camper and a new pickup truck (a red Ford Ranger) and dabbled in archery. Though famously social - he was a regular at one particular Robin's Donuts - Jason was not a fan of cameras, ducking out of the way whenever someone tried to snap a photo.

Jason married Hala Iskharya on 16 November 2006. The reception was in his parent's backyard. They resided in Regina, and Jason was very active in the church.

Jason was especially close to Madeline, his two-year-old niece. "He was talking about having his own kids, and he felt that his job here couldn't properly provide for a kid", his brother says. "He wanted to better his life."

Several years later, one of Jason's cousins on his father's side owned a plumbing and heating company in Edmonton and offered him the chance to be an apprentice. It meant moving eight hours from home, but Jason was anxious for the opportunity. Jason left for Alberta on 8 February 2013.

The plan was to settle in Edmonton, spend a few weeks on the job, and prepare for Hala to join him. He texted his mom every day, telling her how much he was enjoying his new job and his new city.

Five days later, on 12 February, Jason was at a job site in nearby Fort Saskatchewan, working in the basement of a partially finished house. For some reason, a gas leak triggered a massive explosion. Severely burned, Jason died the following morning.

Two of his cousins, brothers Wilf and Wes Michalycia, remained in hospital, one later dying. Jason was 33 years old when he died.





MARIA CAROLINA ASSMANN & HEINRICH HEINEMANN

Maria (Mary) Carolina Assmann was born 11 August 1908 to Karl Assmann (1858-1926) and Katharina Elisabeth (Lizzie) Erbach (1863-1945), at home on the farm at Neudorf, Saskatchewan, Canada.¹ She died 28 January 2002, Kipling, Saskatchewan.² She was married to **Heinrich (Henry) Heinemann**, born 27 November 1905 to Karl Heinemann and Anna Heinemann, neé Karius. Heinrich died 21 June 1973.



Mary was the youngest in her family, and like many of her older siblings, she attended Baber school, while growing up on the family farm.³ Mary married Heinrich Heinemann on 22 July 1928 at St. John's Lutheran Church, Neudorf. Witnesses to this wedding were Adolf Assman (her brother), Emma Assman (a niece), Philip Erbach (possibly her uncle on her mother's side of the family) and Clara Heineman (maybe a sister or niece on Henry's side of the family).⁴



POSTSCRIPT

So this is the “History of the Assmann Family” as it can be told at the end of 2024.

And, to say it straight away: some biographical data and facts may not be complete, some are probably missing, and there will most likely also be a few mistakes or errors to be discovered in the text.

But that is the characteristic of every historical account: it is based on the material that is available, and it can hardly ever be absolutely objective, but is always the result of interpretation. And, of course, it also depends on how much time and energy was available for the research. Womanpower, to be precise here.

Moreover, the story doesn't end here, it continues. It would be wonderful if this family history could be an inspiration for many of you to rummage through your own memories. There are certainly many things that would make this family picture even more colourful and detailed. Variety is the motto here: from e.g. photos, documents or newspaper clippings to everything that makes individual family life so special – be it the recollections of special traditions, be it songs or stories, be it special recipes.

The “History of the Assmann Family” shows that the Assmanns have made their homes in many different places around the world: In Canada, the USA, New Zealand, Germany and Austria. And the wonderful thing is that they have not lost touch with each other, but that contacts have even intensified in recent times - which is certainly related to the current interest in this special family history.

So: the story continues - may it bring us all happiness and joy.

THE SPECIAL DAY FEBRUARY 2, 1938

It was a cold stormy windy day.

Dad took the lantern and walked up on the hill. Walking back and forth (west was the well, good water). Waiting for the Dr. [W.A. Bearden] to come by cutter and horse. I think Dr brought Aunt Mary Piller (Lorraine Bruch's mother). By early morning Mary and Johnny were born. Johnny always said he was a gentleman (lady's first). When we went to the bedroom, there was Phil, Mary and Johnny on the bed. Mary was called Gertie and Johnny was Henzie. It was when they started school when they were called Mary and Johnny. Always happy and pleasant to everyone young or old. Always had friends.

Cold winter evening, Johnny would walk from one window to another, waiting for someone to come and visit or play. As for Mary, when Eddy [Tank] came my courting days. One time he came, brought me cherries. His words were to (cool your temper).

Next time he came, Mary went and asked, "Where are the cherries?"

Eddy had a red truck on the box he put his initials, E.M. Tank by this time they could read. So Mary asked, "Is your name, Mary, too!?"

Eddy also in summer time he wore white trousers with a coloured shirt. Mary asked him why he is wearing underwear?

Was a busy but happy household - washday every day. We were happy when we came to school. Children Adults. Always asked how are the Twins? We always felt very proud and happy to say they are doing well.

I guess by the time they started school/church everyone was glad to see, hear, and play with them.

My evening chore was to rock the 3 to sleep [Phil 13 months old, Mary and Johnny]. Johnny right, Philip left side in the rocking chair and Mary in the middle. Most of the time, I succeeded, I think, putting them to sleep.

WHAT WAS IT LIKE LIVING ON A FARM?

Homestead - 4 miles NW of Killaly, $\frac{3}{4}$ section 11-21-7 W2, mixed farming.

No Electricity: kerosene or coal oil lamps were used for light.

Car garage was built with an extra length added for the purpose of storing ice blocks in the cellar below. Ice was carved by saw from a dugout and hauled by sleigh and stacked on top of each other and covered with saw dust; this kept perishable food (dairy products and table food) cool all summer.

Included in this addition was a separator that separates milk into cream and skimmed milk which was consumed while the rest was used to feed calves. Enough cream was saved to make butter and cottage cheese; the excess was sold. The cream was stored in a 5 gallon cream can and sold to the Co-op creamery for \$5.00.

Eggs sold from about 50 chickens were also sold for about \$.35 dozen. The money from the eggs and cream was Mom's spending money for daily household needs. Pigs were also a source of income at about \$40, cows \$200, chickens \$1.

Firewood was used for oven cook stoves and coal burning heaters for warmth.

Drinking water pumped from a well.

Rain collecting system was the runoff water from the house roof into a large water tank. In the '50s when another addition to the house was added a hand pump was installed beneath the floor.

Laundry day (Mondays) water or snow was collected in a large boiler and heated on the wood stove.

A wringer washing machine was hand powered; soiled clothes were rubbed and moved through water.

Clothes were hung outside on clothes lines. In the winter when clothes froze would be taken indoors or to a grain bin to dry. Clothes were sprinkled with water and pressed with stove heated irons.

We had a windmill to provide power in the early 1950s. The windmill charged 32 batteries in the house basement which generated power for household use. It is at this time kerosene and coal oil lamps were replaced with light bulbs, electric irons and washing machine. When the wind didn't blow, we couldn't use the electric appliances.

Out-house two seat toilets or indoor chamber pot.

Smoke sheds used for smoking sausage, bacon sides and other meats dominate the prairie landscape.

Telephone party line circuit shared by 6 local farm subscribers. A central phone station operator in Neudorf connected long distance callers and emergency alerts. The wooden box phone was attached to the wall.

Carrots, cabbage, poppy seeds and several hundred pounds of potatoes stored in the house cellar (half earth, half cement). Peas, corn, beans, rhubarb, chicken, beef, liver sausage and cream were preserved in two quart sealers in a hot water canner on the stove. Mother would literally preserve hundreds of quarts of vegetables and fruit. Wild Saskatoons, chokecherries, raspberries and bought fruit were prepared in jars of jams and jellies.

Six horses were required for the operation of the farm used to pull implements to cultivate, seed and harvest crops of wheat, oats and barley. In Fall 4 horses are hitched to a binder where grain sheaves are bound with twine physically eight sheaves made up one stoke of many to dry until threshing began. When rain would wet the stokes it would delay the threshing until it dried again. My dad and neighbor Carl

Gerhardt co-shared ownership of a steel wheeled tractor and threshing machine. Four neighboring farmers involved met deciding the rotation of farm land to be threshed.

Many long hours of hard work six days a week. House wives prepared 3 meals and 2 lunches for all the men. Often teens help was not available because school had started. The women would take over the fall chores and continue with daily duties with the children.

The family farm, church, and school were Mary's life – sheltered and reserved. The radius of her travel for the first 16 years were about 50 miles from home.

WHAT WERE YOUR MOM AND DAD LIKE WHEN YOU WERE A CHILD?

I remember my mom holding her German Bible with worn pages. She knelt with us kids at her bedside for nightly prayers.

She was a kind and godly mother that taught us how to behave and treat others with respect and dignity. Seldom was she idle besides her home and family responsibly she would meet with neighbors and quilt donations for Lutheran Relief.

Sundays was always a day of rest. Church services were every Sunday at 3:00. It was usually preached in German and there was no Sunday school. We all attended regularly, snow, sleet or rain.

My father after morning chores before breakfast went faithfully to the living room window pulled the sheers behind him and quietly prayed. Grace was said before meals blessing our food with thankfulness.

Our family attended Killaly St. John's Lutheran Church services every Sunday sharing congregation pastoral resources with Christ Lutheran Church in Neudorf. In the early '50s W. Riekert was the pastor and as teenagers Philip, Johnny and I attended 2 hour confirmation classes via a train to Neudorf.

Confirmations day was a solemn commitment for 18 confirmands by confidently giving testimony to the congregation when questioned by the pastor why we believe Jesus is Lord and the Bible is the true word of God, hence becoming a Lutheran church member.

A verse sang on confirmation Sunday, "Take my hand dear Father and lead thou me and at journey's end dwell with thee, alone I will not wonder one single day so do thou guide my footsteps on life's rough way."

I am thankful to my parents, pastor and church for continuing their faith journey of Christian heritage from generation to generation. Was it a coincidence that when Pastor Riekert transferred to Trinity Lutheran Church, Regina, that my future husband Don was also confirmed at Trinity prior to our marriage?

Leaving farm life in 1963 my parents moved to Melville enjoying city living. Father was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer suffering severe pain for many months cared for by mother and older sisters. Three days prior to his death he was hospitalized and with his loving family at his bedside recited his familiar prayer of faith and consciously participated in the Lords supper. Passed away at 78.

Mother was hospitalized for 2 1/2 years with a stroke completely paralyzed also effecting her ability to speak. It was with compassion we understood her frustration with her many attempts to communicate with us. Prayed that she felt our hugs and kisses. Passed away at 79.



HOW DID YOU GET TO SCHOOL AS A CHILD?

We lived on a farm 4 miles from Killaly School. Two elementary rooms and one high school.

My dad during the winter hitched a horse to a sleigh, handed the reins to the oldest brother as the driver. A blanket made with tanned horse hide and a heated stone were used for warmth to and from school. Because we lived in a remote area there was no snow ploughing for most of the winter. Fresh snow sleigh trails were made winding through several farm yards and fields. I recall when we tipped out of our sleigh because of a high snow drift. Fortunately our horse did not run away and we arrived home safely.

Our transportation to school was a one horse drawn sleigh or buggy. Our trip of 3.5 miles to the livery barn in Killaly followed by a 12 minute walk to the two-room school. Our horse was kept in the livery barn for the day. Our wearing apparel consisted of: hooded parka, breeches, long underwear, felt shoes inside boots, knitted scarves and mitts. A one horse buggy was used for the summer months.

In 1954-1955, because Mary was the last child in the family attending school, she was boarding with Aunt Mary Piller during winter Monday to Friday. My bedroom was in a unheated attic with an open stairway. It was used for storage, for clothing etc., hanging on rafters, one light bulb. It was cold and sometimes I felt afraid. A mature teacher also roomed and boarded with us. She ate her meal and disappeared into her room until morning. We all went to bed at 9:00. My weekly clothing suitcase from home consisted of underwear, PJ's, perhaps 1 top brush, comb and pads. I wore 1 pair of jeans for the week and I exchanged washed jeans when I returned to school the following week.

The warmer season Mary continued to ride alone in a horse drawn buggy.

Mary did not socialize outside of school hours. There were only six students in her class in a one-room Killaly High School. She completed grade 9 but did not pass, that is she was the only one taking Home Economics. I did not receive instructions of any kind she was given a book to read.

At 17, Mary regrettably did not return to school.

When living in Yorkton I attended high school upgrade classes and received my GED grade 12 Certificate which was required for Provincial Government employment.

HOW DID YOU GET YOUR FIRST JOB?

In the Fall of 1957, at age 18 with suit case, \$40 and a one way ticket to Regina via Greyhound bus, I left my secure farm life behind. I moved in with my sister Emma and her friend Ethel Hauser. We shared a kitchen and a large room in the upstairs of a house; rent was \$37.

I wasted no time looking for work. I accepted my first job offer from the Co-Op Creamery starting immediately. My temporary position was to towel dry turkeys that had been soaked in cold water prior to being sealed in plastic freezer bags ready for market. I received \$10 per day.

My second job in Regina was working three weeks at Simpson Sears Catalogue warehouse packaging children's parkas for mail orders.

Amazingly my sister Emma submitted a character reference at General Films where she was employed and I started work two weeks later. I held several positions and worked there for five years, 1957 - 1963.

My first position I was revising 16 mm films which were rented out to small town theaters. (Reels of film were checked for tears by placing your fingers over the film and running the whole reel from beginning to end and splicing the tear. Boring!)

Last 4 years, I was promoted to photographic equipment advertising and managing office mailings. I loved this job.

I worked until June 1st prior to the birth of Shelley June 20, 1961. I resigned my job for 10 months and was rehired. I stayed home collecting unemployment insurance for 9 months before returning to work at General Films.

Babysitters for Shelley were: Freda Sprigs, Arlene Peppler, Doris Rogoz, and Sue Crawford between 1961 and 1968.

MARY'S TESTIMONIES

My First Time Experiencing a Healing

In 1973, at the close of the church board meeting Pastor Koester prayed for a healing for Don as he could barely speak and had mentioned he was scheduled for surgery on his sinuses in 10 days.

This surgery involved operating through his mouth and stuffed with cotton to stop the bleeding before returning home.

On January 9, Don was admitted to the hospital and another x-ray was taken prior to his surgery the next morning which was a normal practice.

January 10, Don was prepared for surgery by injection him with anesthetic in the operating room. The doctor approached with x-ray in hand announced with astonishment that Don's sinuses were normal and the surgery was cancelled.

After a short nap to overcome the drowsiness from the anesthetic, Don called me to my surprise to pick him up and take him home. Don's office had a gift delivered to the hospital that morning before he had a chance to tell them the surgery was cancelled and that he would return back to work.

Don had an appointment previously scheduled with his doctor following surgery and looked forward to seeing him and to tell him about his miraculous healing but suddenly his doctor had passed away before he saw him.

Full Gospel Businessmen, 1977

It is a Christian God believing bible based organization where men gather monthly to pray and share the gospel.

Don was invited to attend and was listening intently to several testimonies of past sessions one of which was how the power of the Holy Spirit was able to curb the desire to smoke.

He had started smoking at age 9 often rolling his own cigarettes. Now at age 40 he had tried kicking the habit without success. When the alter call was presented to come forward for prayer he did without hesitation folding his hands, closed eyes and agreeing with the prayer to stop smoking.

The next day, Don, did not desire to smoke but carried his cigarettes in his pocket for days before finally discarding them for good.

Mary Diagnosis of Suspicious Breast Cancer.

I had a hysterectomy in 1979, the operation went well and it was recommended to have an 8 week convalescent time off work. Following an 8 day discharge from the hospital I begin to notice that I had noticeable secretion leaking from my nipples which alarmed me; I called my gynecologist for a checkup.

To my surprise the doctor phoned Don at his work place whom he had never met to tell him he suspected cancer and he made an appointment for me to have a CT scan at the Plains Hospital in 3 weeks.

This news put me in a tailspin of fear as the C word could mean many things which I could not cope with very well. Many fearful thoughts haunted me: Will my life come to an end? Shelley (12) Shay (5), how would Don manage raising our daughters? My nerves were so intense I had to stand up in order to swallow water.

Pastor Dan was a preacher that would persistently encourage our congregation to read, trust and have faith in God's promises, which he was so capable of teaching. Weekly life with God classes and the added Sunday evening services became our way of life. His preaching included healing sessions.

Now that my life was in an uncertain situation I had to draw on my faith to get me through this ordeal so I didn't hesitate searching for spiritual intervention.

1. Pastor Dan and Pastor Muller, a visiting pastor, prayed with me in his church office.
2. Glen Elm Church prayer chain from the church prayed. (I was also a coordinator at the time.
3. Don, without hesitation, asked the elders after a council meeting to come to our house to pray for me which they did, anointing me with oil on my forehead.

James 5:14-16

Is any sick among you? Let him call for the elders of the church; and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up; and if he have committed sins, they shall be forgiven him. Confess your faults one to another, and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much.

4. I called my school friend Marlene and her husband from Langley. I explained my dilemma and my request for prayer; we often discussed the power of prayer taught by Pastor Dan which they also believed in the divine healing by the Holy Spirit.

Their prayer group were gathering the next evening and Marlene would sit in proxy for me.

During that same night I was very restless and could not sleep until shortly before dawn. In desperation I cried out to God help me, take control of my life; a term I never heard before, immediately a surge of warmth entered my body and a sense of relief encompassed me into a deep sleep. The next morning Marlene called saying yes we did pray for you last night and the interpretation from the Lord was that you have been healed. Then continued, I am not sure how you would be convinced this happened via proxy as this is a new revelation for us. Yes, Marlene it did happen I felt a surge of warmth all over my body.

On the third week the CT scan result revealed that the results were negative. I cannot confirm either way if there was a healing or if there never was cancer, BUT what I do know is that I had a spiritual healing.

Perfect Timing

My twin brother Johnny was a normal fun-loving hard working individual; he never married and as an adult occasionally lived with our parents. He had various jobs over the years but his passion was farming and later in life gave that up. In his mid-50s he suffered from mental illness, which likely was brought on following our mother's stroke leaving her paralyzed in hospital for 2 years before she passed away. He could not bear to visit her in the hospital. Our family was saddened as he distanced himself from our family of 11 and eventually was hospitalized and cared for by the psychiatric unit at the Yorkton hospital. We visited him several times a year while a patient there.

On one Sunday evening church service at prayer time pastor Dan asked us to find someone near us and pray together. Don moved to pray with another man across the aisle and I remained sitting with a lady I had never met before. I asked her if she had any special prayer requests and she told me that her brother from B.C. and she had an argument which she desperately wanted prayer to reconcile. I could not recall what my prayer need was at that time.

When we were through praying together she asked did you notice a veil covering us while in prayer blocking out all sound from others praying and I said, "no, tell me about it I had never heard of that before." God was in our midst she tearfully implied.

Returning home at 9:30, we unlocked our door to a ringing phone. It was brother Johnny, I was in disbelief it was him, I asked him if there was any special reason he called but he said no just thinking of us. The conversation was like a dream come true since not receiving calls from him for several years.

That was the last time we communicated followed by a suicidal overdose sometime later.



I believe that the prayer at church for this lady's brother for reconciliation and forgiveness was also my heart's desire for me and my brother. It is no coincidence that God's perfect timing for the phone call from Johnny is a reminder how much God loves me, giving me peace by not feeling guilty about how Johnny ended his life.



APPENDIX 2

JUDITH SILVERTHORNE: HOW I BECAME A FAMILY HISTORIAN. A TRIBUTE TO EDWARD ASSMANN

Without Edward Assmann, this Assmann Family History would not exist!

When I was about ten or twelve, my family visited my grandparents on their farm near Grenfell, where they had moved in 1961. One day, my mom's cousin, Edward (Eddy) Assmann, stopped by. I was captivated by the way he asked questions—digging for stories, dates, and details about our ancestors. That encounter planted a seed.

Years later, in the 1970s, I was inspired to begin my own family history research. I reached out to Edward, only to learn he had sadly passed away on March 1, 1975, at the age of 59. Undeterred, I contacted his widow, Elizabeth (Beth) Assmann, and eventually, she arrived at my doorstep with a box of his research—first as a loan, then as a gift. Inside were precious details collected from older relatives, many already gone.

From there, I began writing letters across North America, connecting with family members and collecting stories. I was fortunate that some grandparents, great-grandparents, and great-aunts and uncles were still alive, offering memories that enriched the growing archive.

In 1980, using Edward's notes and my own research, I compiled a modest family history booklet. I typed it by hand on an old typewriter, added a few photographs and hand-drawn maps, and made family tree charts. I distributed copies to relatives for the cost of printing. Then life took over—I moved, started a family, and set the project aside for many years.

It wasn't until meeting Shelley in 2013 that my passion was reignited. We initially focused on the North American branches, but as she discovered the depth of my research into earlier times, we expanded our research to the Old Countries. Our travels through Europe became a shared journey of discovery, piecing together the lives of our ancestors.

It has been a deeply rewarding experience—but it all began with that early encounter with Edward Assmann and the curiosity he sparked in me.

This family history is dedicated to his memory, with heartfelt thanks to Beth Assmann for preserving and sharing his invaluable collection.
